## Victory Over Japan Tops Objectives of Attlee

to survive the tide of labor votes which repudiated the party and the philosophy of free private enterprise for which it stood.

For Churchill, since 1940 the empire's outstanding figure, there was left the relatively humble position of leader of the House of Commons minority—one so small it can wield but little influence in shaping Britain's immediate fate.

The leftward tide of votes swamped his conservative party in the worst political defeat the party has suffered in many years, and gave the laborites the first clear Commons majority any party ever held in Britain.

Most commentators agreed that the election result did not constitute a personal repudiation of Churchill, whose record as a war leader was praised even by the staunchest of labor supporters. But none denied this was a swift leftward surge for traditionally conservative Britain.

Some attributed it to natural dissatisfaction among the people after six years of wartime hardship. Socialism to Shake Nation

The labor party is committed to a socialistic program which can shake the foundations of British economy as it is constituted at present. The party calls for nationalization of basic industries such as coal, iron and steel and inland transportation, and of the Bank of England.

"We are embarking on a great adventure," Attlee declared, summarizing the party goal as "the highest standard of life we can achieve for all."

"We want a security that will banish war forever," asserted the 62-year-old labor leader who worked 26 years in politics for this change to test his socialist theories in action.

"We want widespread prosperity for all people," he said. "We must reconstruct our ruined homes and build up the highest standard of life we can achieve for all."

Churchill, in a valetictory statement as prime minister, said all plans and preparations had been made for a victory over Japan which might come "much quicker than we have hitherto been entitled to expect," and declared he regretted he had not been permitted to finish that job.

There was some speculation here that the ultimate effect of the election would be to bring Russia and Britain closer together on some issues. Prof. Harold Laski, chairman of the labor party's executive committee, said the victory would make possible "full friendship" with the Soviet union and that the government would be in a position to do "full justice" to the Spain of General Franco.

Attlee also spoke for "cooperation with other nations, particularly our great allies, the United States of America and the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics."
