Ration Values to Rise Sunday on 6 Articles of Food

WASHINGTON, July 27.—(AP)—Housewives, whose point worries have been chiefly red, got blue news yesterday about the blues. Beginning Sunday, six canned and bottled foods take on sharply increased ration values. The increases, effective through the five-week period ending September 1, apply to canned spinach, asparagus, applesauce, apples, apricots and grape juice. However, grapefruit, juice, orange and grapefruit blends, tomato catsup and chili sauce will require fewer points. These are the only changes for the period except that a No. 10 can of corn (6 pounds, 10 ounces) will require 130 instead of 100 points. These big can are sold chiefly to hotels and restaurants. Increases and Decreases Here are the increases: Spinach, No. 2 can, 30 points, up 10; No. 2 1/2 can, 50 points, up 20; asparagus, No. 2 can 30 points, up 10; applesauce, No. 2 can, 20 points, up 10; apples, No. 2 can, 20 points, up 10; apricots, No. 2 1/2 can, 50 points, up 20; grape juice, pint, 40 points, up 10; grape juice, quart, 70 points, up 20. The decreases: Orange and grapefruit juice blends, 46-ounce can, 10 points, down 10; No. 2 can, 10 points for two cans, down 10; grapefruit juice, 46-ounce can, 10 points, down 10; No. 2 can, 10 points for two cans, down 10; tomato catsup and chili sauce, 14-ounce size, 10 points, down 10. Supplies Reduced The OPA said in announcing the point changes that new supplies of asparagus and spinach for civilians will be only about half as large as from the last pack. Smaller amounts of both canned apples and applesauce also have been allocated from the 1945-46 pack. The prospective

More Beds Sought for Oregon Vets' Hospital

PORTLAND, July 28.—(AP)—The Portland veterans hospital expansion committee said yesterday 172,464 Oregon servicemen of three wars are potential patients for the 500-bed veterans' hospital here. Chairman D. B. Chown said his committee seeks 1,500 more beds for the hospital on Marquam hill because facilities will soon be inadequate. He said there are already 133,464 Oregon World War II veterans, 35,000 World War I veterans and 4,000 Spanish-American veterans. Portland and Multnomah, Clackamas, Washington and Columbia counties are the home area of 59,318 of these men, Chown said.

Senators Misled on Lamb Situation, OPA Man Says

PORTLAND, July 28.—(AP)—District OPA Director McDannell Brown has declined to recommend to national headquarters any release of additional grades of Oregon soft lamb for point-free purchase. Brown said he has advised Senators Cordell and Morse they are being misinformed by Oregon interests and that OPA surveys reveal lamb moving to market in satisfactory quantities. He has yet to receive a "single complaint" from a lamb producer in answer to the senators' charges that the OPA order was a "mere gesture" and has proved confusing, he declared.

Civilian Workers for Reactivated Camp Adair will be Recruited Here Monday in Redeployment Program

Skilled labor, and a limited amount of unskilled labor, is vitally needed at the Oregon camp, which is being reactivated to process veterans from the European theater for service in the Pacific, according to Major H. L. Dowd, who is directing recruiting in the Southern Oregon area. A recruiting party will be in Roseburg Monday in an effort to obtain civilian workers for the camp.

Major H. L. Dowd and Lieutenant Charles L. Stevens of Camp Adair, Oregon, will be in Roseburg Monday with a sound truck, assigned to the task of recruiting civilian labor for the camp from which thousands of European veterans are to be processed monthly for duty in the Pacific theater. Men and women skilled in more than 40 occupations are needed immediately to fill civilian labor ranks, Major Dowd reports, and an extensive recruiting drive is in progress throughout all of Oregon.

The U. S. Employment service is assisting in the campaign to obtain workers and can supply information to all interested persons.

Persons qualified for the following positions are particularly needed, Major Dowd reports: fanitors, clerks, typists, stenographers, warehousemen, masons, electricians, carpenters, helpers, locksmiths, painters, instrument and small arms repairing, welders, auto mechanics and helpers, auto bodymen, upholsters, painters and helpers, plumbers, bulldozer operators, tractor and grader operators, furnace repair-
