UNRRA Begins Sending Livestock to Europe

The first shipment of livestock under UNRRA's agricultural rehabilitation program reached Greece July 15. It consisted of 335 Brown Swiss heifers, 357 light draft mares, and 12 bulls to rebuild dairy herds and stocks of farm draft animals destroyed during the German occupation.

During the next 18 months, UNRRA plans to buy 25,000 bred heifers and utility cattle for farm work and milk production, and 25,000 work mares and mules. These shipments will go to Greece, Albania, Yugoslavia, Czechoslovakia and Poland, in which five million dairy cattle and draft animals were lost during the war—more than one fifth of the pre-war total. About one-half of the animals will be supplied by the United States, and the other half from Canada, Mexico, Brazil and other United Na-

tions. While only one per cent of the animals lost in war-stricken areas will be replaced by these shipments, the imported animals will increase crop production and will meet the most urgent needs for more milk production.

MOSCOW, July 28 — (AP)—Izvestia said in an editorial today that the outcome of the British general election revealed that the voters were more concerned with internal matters than with foreign policy.

"This reflects the uneasiness of a broad stratum of the people of England over tomorrow, during the complicated reconversion period from war to peace," the editorial said.

CAIRO, July 28 — (AP)—The influential newspaper Albar El Yom said in an editorial today that Egypt was looking to the new British labor government for aid in achieving Egyptian national ambitions.

Among the immediate aims are elimination of outside influence, evacuation of all foreign troops and unification of the southern Sudan with Egypt.
