## GOP Will Offer Own Program at Next Senate Meet

WASHINGTON, Aug. 2—(AP)—A republican legislative program, as well as one sponsored by the Democratic majority, will await the senate when its members come back from the nine-week vacation they began today.

Senator Taft of Ohio, chairman of the republican steering committee, took exception to the agenda presented by Majority Leader Barkley in yesterday's closing session. He said he would make public later this week his own ideas on where the lawmakers should concentrate their efforts.

"Senator Barkley laid misleading emphasis on several things," Taft declared.

For instance, the Ohioan told a reporter, Republicans are more interested in seeing that real jobs are available after conversion than they are in the amount and duration of unemployment compensation.

Barkley placed widened coverage of unemployment compensation and an increase in the rate and duration of such benefits second in his list of "some of the more pressing problems."
