

## Nation's Strikers Reduced to 37,000

(By the Associated Press)  
The total number of workers idle in labor disputes fell to about 37,000 today as 5,000 Crosley corporation employees ended a four-day walkout in Cincinnati.  
The big plant manufactures radi and radar equipment and the War Labor board and Navy department had appealed for a prompt ending of the stoppage.  
In Milwaukee the city's garbage collection and disposal system was paralyzed by a dispute over wage rates and job reclassifications, the fourth walkout in the system in two years.  
The Monsanto Chemical company asked the government to take over operation of its Monsanto, Ill., plant, shut down since Thursday by a jurisdictional dispute between the iron workers and pipefitters unions. Approximately 1,200 persons were idled.  
Of the 30 walkouts and strikes across the country, affecting various industries and businesses, only two others affect more workers than the Crosley stoppage. These are the disputes at the Southeastern Shipbuilding Corp., at Savannah, Ga., idling 7,500 workers, and at Tampa, Fla., where 6,500 cigar makers are on strike.

## Canning With Less Sugar

**Water Pack...** Fruits may be canned satisfactorily without sugar by boiling water or fruit juice in place of sugar syrup. Absence of sugar may cause some loss of color and flavor in the fruit.

**Corn Syrup & Honey...** Corn syrup or honey may be used to replace up to one-half of sugar specified in canning syrups. Corn syrup has one-half the sweetening power of sugar.

**To Make Syrup, Using Corn Syrup...** Combine sugar, syrup and water, then bring to boil.

**To Make Syrup, Using Honey...** Combine sugar and water, bring to boil. Add honey, stir and bring to rolling boil. Skim. Honey imparts its characteristic flavor to fruits. The use of a mild-flavored honey is recommended.

It is best not to use brown sugar or molasses in canning.
