

Self-Financing Peacetime Farm Program Offered

WASHINGTON, Aug. 3.—(AP)—W. R. Ronald, editor of the Mitchell (S. D.) Daily Republic, proposed yesterday what he termed a "self-financing peacetime farm program" designed to bring at least parity prices to farmers.

Ronald submitted his plan to the Agriculture Department Reorganization committee, headed by Milton Eisenhower, president of Kansas State college.

Invited by Secretary of Agriculture Anderson to confer with the committee, Ronald said his plan should add "from 15 to 25 billion dollars to the national income."

Main features include:

1. Farmers to provide a conservation fund themselves by means of an excise tax of possibly 25 per cent of the price of the first sale of their products.

2. The tax would be paid back to the farmers, according to the degree of their adherence to conservation practices. Those rating 100 per cent on conservation would receive all their tax back, with premiums (these to be paid by the government) paid to those with higher ratings.

3. Loans on any crops would be available at full parity prices. These would be handled through banks with the government guaranteeing them.

4. Maximum acreages for each crop would be announced yearly by the Secretary of Agriculture "to provide an abundance of food stuffs of all kinds." This acreage would be allocated by the farmers themselves.

Ronald said operation of the plan would reduce drastically the size of the Agriculture department by eliminating various agencies. He added: "Give the farmer a fair price and a large part of the Department of Agriculture could be abolished."

Industrial Peace Plan Offered by Sen. Vandenberg

WASHINGTON, Aug. 3.—(AP)—Senator Vandenberg yesterday proposed a conference of top spokesmen for labor, management and government to seek industrial peace.

Vandenberg submitted his plan in a letter to Secretary of Labor Schwelmbach, who endorsed it in a prompt reply.

The senator suggested that leaders of each branch of the nation's economy copy the example set at San Francisco when 50 nations "frankly faced" their problems in a "triumph of the council table." Vandenberg was a delegate to the San Francisco conference, which drafted the recently-ratified United Nations charter.

"Is it impossible to apply this formula at home in respect to vital industrial relationships?" the Michigan senator asked.

He said he was particularly concerned that "needless strife" would impair reconversion to peace production "and permanently jeopardize the country and all its citizenship."

Schwelmbach, a former senator, told Vandenberg in his letter and in a personal conference that he has "been thinking more and more during these last few weeks about the desirability of calling a conference of industry and labor."

Vandenberg contended that industrial peace cannot "be dictated by summary legislation." But it can be written into law, he said, "by the common recommendation of all concerned if they can meet together, under proper auspices, to face a challenge which cannot long go unanswered."

Union Asks Impeachment Of Mississippi Senator

NEW YORK, Aug. 3.—(AP)—New York members of the National Maritime union (CIO) have asked Sen. Wagner (D-N.Y.) to start impeachment proceedings against Sen. Bilbo (D-Miss.).

Port Agent Joseph Stack said the request was made in a resolution, adopted unanimously at a membership meeting, charging Bilbo with carrying on one of the most "vicious attacks on all racial minorities in the history of this country."

The action followed publication of correspondence in which the Mississippi senator accused a New York woman as "Dear Daggo" and referred to Walter Winchell as a "kike."

Labor Dept. Aides Named
WASHINGTON, Aug. 3.—(AP)—Labor Secretary Schwelmbach yesterday appointed John W. Gibson, head of the Michigan CIO council, and Albert Abrahamson of Brunswick, Maine, war refugee board assistant, as special assistants to the Secretary of Labor.

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
