**Son of Scottsburg Residents Flies in Notable Squadron**  
TINIAN — John H. Thomas, 26, aviation chief radioman, USN, of Lakeside, Ore., has completed more than 60 missions with a Navy air squadron in the Pacific.  
Thomas, radioman aboard a twin-engine bomber, son of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph F. Thomas, of Scottsburg, Ore., is married to the former Margaret Murry, who lives with their two children, John Henry III and Karen Margaret, in Lakeside.  
Thomas is a graduate of North Bend, Ore., High school, where he played football and basketball. He has been in the Navy since August, 1936, saw duty in the battles of Midway, Santa Cruz and the Solomons before joining his present squadron.  
The squadron to which he is attached is part of a search and reconnaissance unit which has been making Navy history by daring attacks on the Japanese homeland.  
The squadron aided in the neutralization of Nauru, the Marshalls, Fagan and Rota in the Marianas, Wakeal and Yap in the Carolines. It also furnished an air screen for the fleet in the attacks and landings on Palau, the Philippines, Iwo Jima and Okinawa, as well as a cover for the first carrier task force attack on Japan proper. Its planes were a constant menace to Japanese shipping off the Japanese coast.  
Thomas recalls a night bombing attack on runways and gun installations on Nauru island as one of the most exciting experiences of his combat duty.
