

Atomic Bomb Developed
To Use in Crushing Japs

entirely new concept of force and power. The actual harnessing of atomic energy may in the future supplement the power that now comes from coal, oil and the great dams, he said.

"It has never been the habit of scientists of this country or the policy of this government to withhold from the world scientific knowledge," Mr. Truman said. "Normally, therefore, everything about the work with atomic energy would be made public."

That will have to wait, however, until the war emergency is over.

"Staggering" Imagination
Secretary Stimson predicted today that the atomic bomb will "prove a tremendous aid" in shortening the war with Japan.

The War secretary made his statement as the army reported that an "impenetrable cloud of dust and smoke" cloaked Hiroshima after it was hit by the new weapon from the air.

An accurate assessment of the damage inflicted by the bomb is not yet available, however, the War department said.

Stimson said that the explosive power of the bomb is such as to "stagger the imagination." He added that scientists are confident of developing even more powerful atomic bombs.

Security Imposed
Stimson said that security requirements do not permit disclosure of the exact methods of producing the bomb or the nature of its action. He did say, however, that uranium ore is essential to the production of the bomb.

Development of the bomb culminated three years of work by allied scientists, industry, labor and military forces, Stimson said, adding that he was convinced Japan will not be in a position to use a similar weapon. While Germany worked "feverishly" to develop an atomic bomb, Stimson said, the Navy defeat now has crashed danger from that source.

Stimson said that the commission to control production of atomic power within the United States, adding:

"I shall make recommendations to congress as to how atomic power can become a powerful and forceful influence towards the maintenance of world peace."

Both Mr. Truman and secretary Stimson, while emphasizing the peacetime potentiality of the new force, made clear that much research must be undertaken to effect full peacetime application of its principles.

of these studies, port officials are advised, indicate that the Umpqua river will be one of the safest and easiest to enter when jetty improvements now being planned are completed.

Reedsport and Gardiner Chambers of Commerce, port officials and Army engineers have been making careful analysis of possibilities for shipping lumber by barges and the first actual test will be watched with a great deal of interest.

Development of the port is projected hand-in-hand with efforts to secure better transportation from inland points, particularly through improvements to the Drain-Reedsport road and the state secondary highway from Elkton to Sutherlin. Development of these roads to carry lumber on a water grade from inland points to the port of Umpqua, it is contended, will make possible water transportation on products from central valley mills at a very great saving in cost over rail shipment.

land waterways.

Tokyo Also Blasted
Japanese also reported Mustangs raked the capital with rockets, bombs and machinegun bullets in daylight for the third time in four days.

Nine Mustangs were lost in the two previous strikes, Friday and Sunday. Both raids were made by about 100 planes. They accounted for 12 enemy planes, 24 locomotives and 19 small boats, and hammered assorted military installations and factories.

Twenty bombers from Okinawa, grounded for two days by weather, rode the tail of a typhoon Saturday over southern Japan. They hit the rail center of Tanabe so hard that rear echelons "flew through thick smoke and flying wreckage." Pilots said they saw a chemical plant "lift up and fall apart."

Topping other air strikes the length of the Mikado's empire, seven Philippine-based fighters struck for the first time at the former Dutch Naval base of Soerabaja on Java, refueling on Borneo. They destroyed 37 locomotives.

Tokyo Wails Of Defense Lack
Primary Japanese concern was over the B-29s which Tokyo radio said were raining fire bombs on "defenseless" smaller cities "for the sole purpose of massacring as many innocent civilians as possible."

Among these "defenseless" cities was Toyama, leading aluminum producing city on the Japan sea, whose industrial area B-29 headquarters said was "totally destroyed" in the record raid last Thursday.

For consolation, Japanese propagandists reported: Americans "lead a starvation life." Nipponese raiders caught U. S. planes lined up wing to wing on two Okinawa air fields; a U. S. submarine was sunk off the coast of Japan; Nipponese subs sank two allied vessels in the central Pacific.

50,000 Chinese Slain
Chinese reports told of new terror in China. Once-beautiful Kweilin, Former southeast China air base city, was left thoroughly sacked. Fifty-thousand Chinese were killed or missing from Kansen in east central China. A thousand civilians were reported killed by forced poisonous injections at Ichang, enemy-held central China river port.

Americans and Filipinos eliminated an ambushing Japanese company and beat back two desperate counterattacks on northern Luzon island running last week's toll in the Philippines to 4,740 Japanese killed and 44 taken prisoner. U. S. losses for the week were 27 killed, 61 wounded.

Maj. Gen. William Gill offered a 45-day furlough to any member of the 32nd division who captures an enemy general alive. Chief prize is Gen. Yamashita, one-time "Tiger of Malaya" variously reported cornered, killed or flown from Northern Luzon mountains.

In New Guinea mountains two Australian columns were 28 miles from a junction which would isolate the strongest enemy force still on the island.

Two Aussie division's commanders were rescued by an American cruiser when their plane crashed near New Guinea.

Advance elements of 30,000 Canadian soldiers arrived at forward Pacific bases today. They will be followed by Canadian air force units and 60 ships of the Dominion's Navy.

Senator Hiram Johnson
Claimed by Death at 79

Senator Hiram Johnson's life it was said to be the Presidency. Strangely enough, he kept both himself and another—so it is asserted—out of that high office.

Offered the vice-presidential nomination on the Republican ticket with Warren G. Harding in 1920, he refused. Calvin Coolidge accepted and became chief executive when Harding died.

Four years earlier, the famous "sight" of Johnson by Charles Evans Hughes, when the latter was campaigning in California as the Republican presidential nominee, was accounted as having cost Hughes the election. California went for Wilson by 3,806 votes, while Johnson was elected Senator on the Republican ticket by the greatest majority in the then history of the state.

His enemies said Johnson's failure to attain the Presidential nomination of his party in 1920, which virtually meant the Presidency and again in 1924, left him bitter. If it did, he never showed it.

Denunciation left him unbowed. When he became a candidate for a fourth senatorial term in 1934, the Democratic congressman from California endorsed him, his name was filed on almost every ticket and at the primary he scored what amounted to nomination by acclamation.

A striking figure in the Senate since first elected to congress in 1916, he played a leading part in defeating President Wilson's League of Nations covenant and later in opposing United States' adherence to the world court.

His wife, with whom at the time of his death. His son and namesake left San Francisco last night.

more about the size forces they need than the Senate does. With all due respect to the distinguished Senator from Colorado (Johnson), I think the size of the Army is a matter which should be left to the commander-in-chief and the Army general staff.

Thomas already was on record with this statement: "It is time we stopped fooling around with the size of the army . . . there is a general rush to collapse the armed services."

Taft called the War department's big army policy "stupid, stubborn," and Johnson challenged Stimson in a letter to disprove the Coloradoan's assertion that there can't be more than 3,000,000 effective on the Pacific front by next year, due to transportation and supply difficulties.

Men are being dispatched to smoke reported in the Green Butte area of the South Umpqua district.

Rainfall accompanying the storm was too light and spotty to aid in fire prevention, foresters reported.

More Fighters Sought
The largest fire, located near Rattlesnake Butte in the remote headwaters section of Steamboat creek, is reported to cover about four acres. Several of the fires are in old burns and could be dangerous if not brought under control promptly. Consequently the forest service is making every effort to get as many men as possible into the various districts, but is having difficulty in enlarging crews.

The Rogue River forest headquarters was asked to send help, but fire jumpers from Grants Pass had been dispatched to the Apple Creek district where the storm started a number of fires. Twelve men were obtained from the Union Creek blaster unit station.

To speed fire fighters to the fires, they were sent out overland without equipment and bedding rolls, but food, tools, radio sets and other supplies were dropped by parachute from a plane piloted by George Felt operating from the Roseburg airport.

C. C. Head Aids Battle
The forest service has a distinguished roustabout working out of the Big Camas ranger station. Earl Wiley, president of the Roseburg Chamber of Commerce, is driving truck and doing K. P. duty and odd jobs, his tour of the forest having been interrupted by the emergency. Wiley accompanied Supervisor V. V. Harpham and Fire Assistant Ray Hampton on what was scheduled to be a weekend inspection trip. When the storm struck, however, Supervisor Harpham personally took over fighting direction on two fires and Hampton was sent into another district to direct fire fighting crews. Wiley, left at Big Camas, volunteered to aid and has been of great assistance in operating supply trucks and aid quarters reports.

One man-caused fire was discovered Saturday night in the Toketee falls district, it was reported. Whether the blaze was started by a fisherman or a member of a survey crew is under investigation.

Flying Boat Crashes In Bay Landing; 1 Hurt
ROCK HALL, Md., Aug. 6.—(AP)—The 72-ton flying boat Hawaii Mars crash-landed and sank in Chesapeake bay yesterday.

A single member of the 10-man crew was injured. No others were aboard.

The plane, capable of carrying 138 passengers, is one of 20 ordered by the Navy from the Glenn L. Martin company of Baltimore.

Launched only two weeks ago, the Hawaii Mars was on a routine test flight over the bay when, a crewman said, the upper section of the plane's vertical fin broke away at an altitude of 6,000 feet.

The Hawaii Mars is a sister-ship of the original Mars, which traveled 325,000 miles in 2,600 flying hours between Alameda, Calif., and Pearl Harbor.
