**Barber License Ruling Favors Japanese Aliens**

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 6 — (AP) — The state board of barber examiners does not have the right to refuse restoration of licenses to Japanese aliens whose licenses in this state have expired within the past five years, Attorney General Neuner notified the board's executive secretary today.

The state has a law forbidding registration of aliens as barbers but it does not affect those registered prior to its passage, Neuner held.

Oregon's law also provides, he pointed out, that a registered barber who retires from practice of barbering for not more than five years is still considered as registered and may renew his certificate of registration upon payment of required restoration fees. After five years he is required to take examinations for registration.
