Business Session Of Port Recorded

REEDSPORT—Commissioners Weatherly, Anderson and Lewis of the Port of Umpqua monthly session held their regular meeting here Monday.

The two other commissioners, Vice-President O. H. Hinsdale and Treasurer James Ford were absent due to personal business.

A bill of the Umpqua River Navigation co., for \$924.44 in connection with removing shoals from the boat channel of Smith river was ordered paid.

A proposition to lease the entire port warehouse submitted by J. P. Callison & Sons Co. of Chehalis, Wash., for storing chittum bark and other herbs, was rejected, but the Callison firm was informed that the port would consider leasing space in the warehouse for that purpose.

Proposed lease of the port tug, Tiger, was again a subject for the commission as the parties interested, who submitted a proposition at the July meeting, failed to sign their contract and the former lessee, Noel Brothers, have thus far failed to turn the Tiger back to the commission.

The next meeting of the commission will be Sept. 10.

Sgt. R. H. Holcomb Spends Furlough at Oakland

Staff Sergeant Ralph H. Holcomb, who was released from German prisoner of war camp last May 2, has arrived in Oakland, Ore., to visit at the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. V. K. Holcomb. He was accompanied by his wife, who has been living in San Francisco.

Sgt. Holcomb, a bombardier with the 8th air force, was shot down over Berlin, suffering minor facial burns when his plane was set afire. He was captured June 21, 1944, and was freed by an English patrol May 2 of this year.

Enlisting in the army air forces in October 1940, he went overseas in October 1943 and was with the first American attack on Berlin.

He has been granted a 75-day furlough, after which he will be reassigned.

Explosion of Elevator Kills Thirteen Persons

PORT ARTHUR, Ont., Aug. 6.—(AP)—At least 13 persons were killed yesterday by an explosion which wrecked a storage elevator of the Saskatchewan Wheat Pool, Ltd., one of the largest at the head of the Great Lakes.

The blast rocked the twin cities of Port Arthur and Fort William. All four walls of the elevator were blown out. The bodies that were found were 200 feet from the building.

The elevator is located near the Port Arthur shipbuilding yards about three miles from the center of the city.

15,677 POWs, Mexicans Aid Northwest Harvests

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 7.—(AP)—As the northwest harvest season nears its peak by the middle of August, 15,677 German prisoners of war and Mexican nationals will be in Oregon, Washington and Idaho fields, the Department of Agriculture reported here today.

The men are working in all phases of the harvests. The department's labor office broke the

figures down by states as follows: Oregon, 1,250 prisoners of war, 3803 Mexicans. Washington, 300 prisoners, 5,508 Mexicans. Idaho, 1,260 prisoners, 3,556 Mexicans.

No Subsidy Program for Feed Wheat Slated Now

No subsidy program for feed wheat will be started at this time, Secretary of Agriculture Anderson has announced. While such a program had been under consideration, there are still too many uncertainties regarding next winter's feed supply and requirements, and large export requirements for wheat for immediate use as feed make it inadvisable to encourage the use of additional wheat for feed by means of subsidies.

Leslie Lilly, 82, formerly of Glide, Ore., died in Corvallis Tuesday, August 7. Funeral services will be held in Corvallis Thursday afternoon, August 9.

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 7.—(AP)—Cascara bark dealers were offered 30 cents a pound—an all-time high—here today, and finding inadequate supplies. One dealer said unprecedented demand for medical supplies plus a drop in offerings caused the price increase. The normal price is around 10 cents a pound.

Normal production of the northwest—the only place in the world where it is produced—is about four million pounds a year, Russell said. The 1944 peel was about two million pounds, and production for this year will be still lower, he added.
