## Master Plan for German Criminal Trials Evolved

LONDON, Aug. 9.—(AP)—A master plan for the mass trial of Germany's arch war criminals before an international military tribunal was signed yesterday by the legal representatives of the United States, Great Britain, Russia and France.

The document gives the high tribunal sweeping powers to punish by death, deprive the convicted of stolen property, disregard "technical rules of evidence" in the interests of speed and take strict measures to prevent delays.

Under the agreement the permanent seat of the tribunal is to be established in Berlin, but the first trial will be held at Nuernberg, long the seat and meeting place of the Nazi party.

The tribunal itself is to consist of four members, each with an alternate, representing the four big powers. Before this body will be arraigned such Nazi bigwigs as ex-Reichsmarshal Hermann Goering, former Foreign Minister von Ribbentrop, Rudolf Hess, Franz von Papen, former ambassador to Turkey; labor front leader Robert Ley; Julius Streicher, the Jew-baiter, and Hans Frank, ex-Nazi governor of Poland.

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## Britain Acclaims Action of Russia

LONDON, Aug. 9.—(AP)—Britain today officially hailed the Russian declaration of war on Japan as a step which will hasten the end of the conflict.

Prime Minister Attlee said the Russian action was "proof of the solidarity that exists between the principal allies" and predicted that it would "shorten the struggle."

"We in Great Britain," said Attlee, "have fully appreciated and understood the tremendous sacrifices and strain imposed on Russia by her heroic campaign against Nazi Germany and we have always had confidence that as soon as victory had been won in the west, Russia would take her stand with her allies against the enemy on the eastern front."

There was some shouting from U. S. soldiers waiting redeployment to the Pacific, but Britishers, emotionally fatigued from six years of war, merely commented, "a jolly good bit of news."

A British war office commentator said little was known here of the soviet strength in Siberia. "We'll just have to wait and see," he said.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 9.—(AP)—Announcement of Russia's entry into the war against Japan brought predictions of a speedy end of the conflict from a few lawmakers remaining in the capital during the summer recess.

"The war against Japan should end speedily," forecast Chairman Connally of the Senate foreign relations committee.

"Russia should be able to drive the Japanese out of the mainland of Asia. The atomic bomb and our navy will conquer the Japanese homeland."

"The clouds are breaking. The sun is shining. Japan began the war by treacherously bombing Pearl Harbor. We shall end the war by bombing Japan into submission."

Senator Ball said practically everyone had expected Russia to declare war sooner or later.

"Coming at this time," he said, "I think Russia at least believes the end of the war is not far away."

Rep. Sabath (D., Ill.) said it "means the early and complete liquidation of Japan and bears out what I have always said, that at the proper time Russia would

join the Allies to help bring about the defeat of Japan."

Russia's entry into the war may cause a sharp upward revision almost immediately in lend-lease estimates.

Although the Soviets have not been active as combatants since the German war ended, they have continued to receive lend-lease shipments. Most of these were food and clothing which moved in lend-lease ships past the Japanese islands to Siberia. This route now will be closed.

The state department had announced that they and 126 other Japanese diplomatic and consular officers and dependents captured in Germany would be quartered here pending arrangements for their exchange for allied prisoners of the Japs.

A special agent of the department said today all of the group, including Ambassador Hiroshi Oshima, would "serve themselves" in a cafeteria.

"They'll know they're prisoners and not guests," the agent said.

They will be permitted to exercise in boarded-up space on the hotel grounds.

## Captured Jap Diplomats On Common POW Level

BEDFORD, Pa., Aug. 9.—(AP)—Glum over the devastating atomic bomb attacks on their homeland, the Japanese ambassador to Germany and his staff were brought to the famous Bedford Springs mountain resort last night for detention—without any of the frills once enjoyed here by presidents and supreme court justices.

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A total of 1432 garments were sent to the San Francisco Red Cross headquarters during the past year by the Douglas County chapter of the American Red Cross, Mrs. Alice Suckling, knitting chairman, stated today.

These articles included 454 sweat-ers, 172 pairs of socks, 209 stumps socks, 49 helmets, 116 pairs of bed socks, 23 mufflers, 320 beanies and 88 pairs of gloves.

Two cartons of knitted goods and hospital articles were also sent.

Most of the articles now being made by the Douglas County chapter are for hospitals and will be needed long after the war is over, Mrs. Suckling said.
