Health Education Agenda for Public Schools Drafted

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 13—(AP)—An outline of what members declared to be the first inclusive state plan for public school health education evolved in the United States was approved by the health instruction sub-committee of the Oregon State Joint Committee for Health and Physical Fitness at a meeting here.

The plan, set up under house bill 53 of the last legislature, is the first to specify what should be included in health education of a child. Dr. Adolph Weinzirl, professor of public health and preventive medicine at the University of Oregon and chairman of the sub-committee, declared.

Included in the course, which covers every year of a child's public school life, are various phases of the study of physiology, nutrition, accident prevention, first aid, control of disease, community health and sanitation, mental hygiene, and similar subjects as well as regular courses in physical fitness, an exercise and sports.

The courses are arranged to run in cycles so that from the first grade on, the same titles will be given to subjects. Thus, early in his school career, a child may study something of nutrition—needs of the body so far as food is concerned—and four years

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Plywood's Role in Construction of Bomb Plant Told

TACOMA, Aug. 13—(AP)—How that the atomic bomb no longer is a secret, the story of another war use for fir plywood can be told.

Ten million square feet of plywood from Pacific Northwest factories went into construction of 3,850 pre-fabricated homes, erected at Richland, Wash., to house workers in the sprawling Hanford Engineering works where the earth-shaking bombs are made. This announcement was made here by officials of Douglas Fir Plywood association, representing the 30 plywood plants.

The plywood-and-glue structures, patterned after a design developed by TVA, were pre-fabricated at the rate of 16 houses a day. So complete was the factory production of the houses that only five per cent of the work was required in the field. House sections were trucked from Toledo to Richland with furniture installed at Portland en route.

The stressed-skin or airplane type construction was followed with plywood panels carrying part of the structural load so that light-weight framing could be utilized with resultant material savings. The contract was completed October, 1944, well ahead of schedule. The other 2,500 houses at the model city of Richland are of lumber constructed in the conventional on-site method.

In addition to the plywood required to build the big segment of the city, hundreds of thousands of feet of the panels were used there for other purposes. Included was the construction of plywood forms for concrete pits and concrete buildings, furniture for homes and offices and for patterns.
