Reedsport Justice Remits Sizable Fund From Fines

REEDSPORT—The county treasury was enriched \$921.82 by the office of the Justice of the Peace of Reedsport district during March of the year. Funds to that amount were forwarded to the county treasurer this week. The Justice of the peace of this district is now on a monthly salary of \$100 per month. The sum of \$465 of the remittance represented fines and costs for driving automobiles while intoxicated. Arrests were made by State Officer Clyde L. Flak and only one of these offenders was a resident of this district. The sum of \$42.50 was collected from auto vehicle operators without vehicle license or operator's license and \$685.20 was collected from logging operations for overloads and loads of overwidth and overheight.

The state treasurer received \$267.82 in addition to the money paid the county from these collections. Two convictions were handed out for drunkenness and disorderly conduct and one of the culprits served a 30-day jail sentence for the offense while the other drew a suspended sentence on condition that he leave the county. A jail sentence of 30 days was given on a petty larceny charge and one party was bound over to the grand jury on the charge of larceny of an automobile. One case of assault was discharged for lack of prosecution.

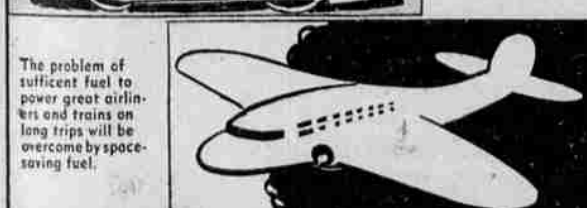
The Promise of the Atom



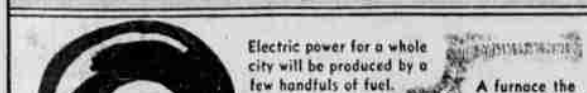
Giant ocean liners will circle the world many times without refueling.
