7 Dead, Score Trapped In Detroit Blast, Fire

DETROIT, Aug. 13—(AP)—Seven persons were known dead and a score or more others were believed trapped in a fire that engulfed the two-story building occupied by the Export Box & Seal Co. on Grand river at Fifteenth street this afternoon. The fire followed an explosion of undetermined cause. The bodies of six victims were found on the sidewalk outside the building, blown there by the explosion. A seventh was seen hanging on a second-story window sill. Police said at least 20 persons were in the blazing building. Five ambulances rushed 30 persons to hospitals.

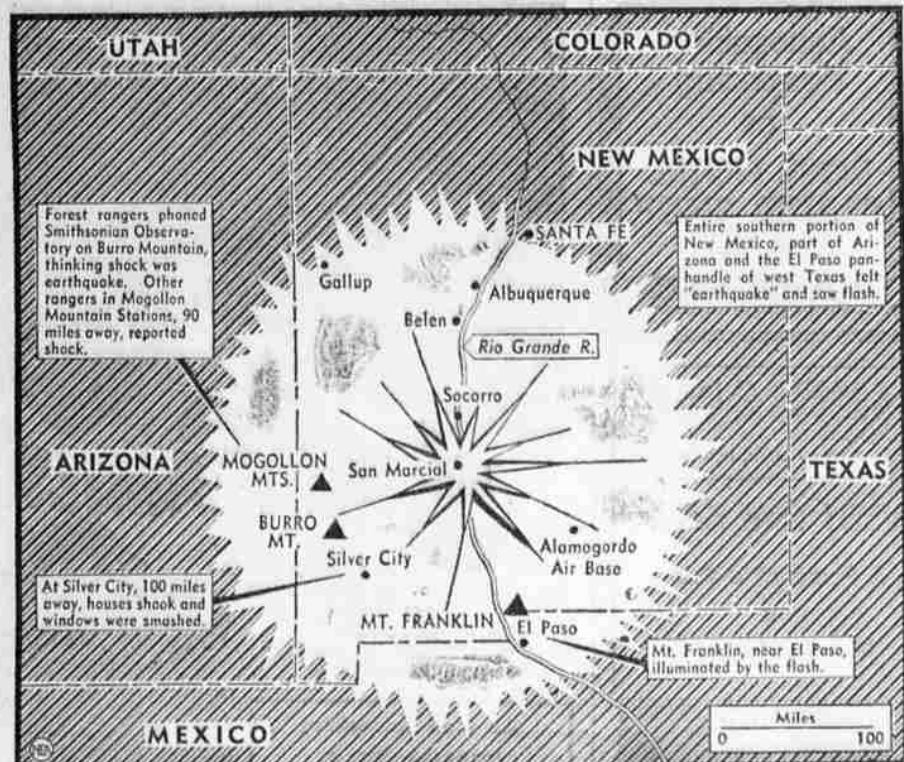
