Tiller Pass Gives Women Bad Time On Horseback Trip

SEATTLE, Aug. 15.—(AP)—After nine weeks on horseback, Mrs. Nellie MacDonald, 55, and a daughter, Mrs. Frances N. Davis, 32, swung down out of their saddles here "even with that ration board" in Santa Cruz, Calif., which refused to issue gasoline so Mrs. MacDonald could come here to inspect a new granddaughter.

They quickly decided that 4-month-old Sandra Jo, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Gary B. MacDonald, was well worth the 1,000-mile trip, and the nights in bed rolls on the hard ground.

"The horses were butterballs, when we started—and so were we," said Mrs. Davis. "They gaunted-down some on the trip—or 30 pounds. Moseying along at 15 to 38 miles a day" they were soaking wet from rain on occasions and blistered in temperatures of up to 116 degrees. Worst of the trip was when they attempted a shortcut through Tiller pass, over the Devil's knob, between Medford and Canyonville, Ore. They went three days without meals and kept to the highway after that.

Glass tall light reflectors, hanging from the saddlebags, gave them traffic protection when they rode after dark.

The trip cost mother and daughter \$175 apiece. They plan to return home the same way after three or four weeks of feasting their eyes on Sandra Jo. Meantime, while they'd like to forget horses-horses-horses for a few days at least... "We'll have to keep riding them a bit every day," said Mrs. MacDonald dolefully, "else they'll stiffen up."

So will Mrs. MacDonald and her daughter, no doubt.

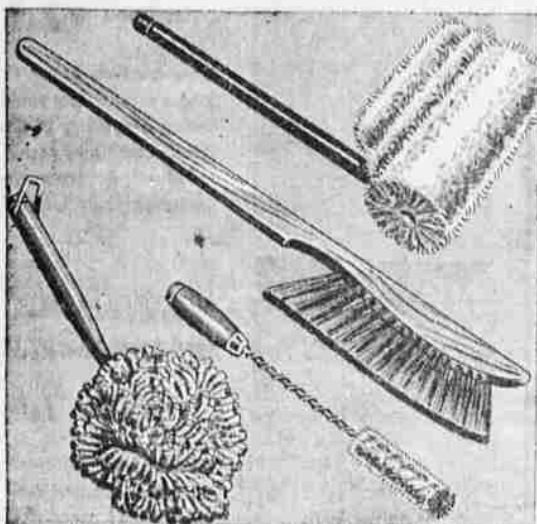

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Feed Supply Key To Meat Problem

The key to the meat production problem may be the corn crop of 1945. Secretary of Agriculture Clinton P. Anderson advises and points out that the American producer of hogs cannot be asked to set a high pig goal for 1946, unless and until we know that there is to be feed available for the increased number of pigs.

July 1 conditions indicated a sharp decrease in corn production this year with total production of the four principal feed grains about 11 per cent smaller than in 1944.

The quantity of all feed concentrates available for the 1945-46 feeding year on the basis of July 1 indications may total about 153 million tons compared with about 162 million tons in 1944-45. The second largest supplies of hay on record are available and the 1944-45 livestock output probably could be maintained even with the reduced feed production by reducing carryover stocks of corn, oats and barley and by feeding a larger-than-average quantity of wheat.

Farm Prices Stay at 19 Pct. Above Parity

Farm product prices on July 15 stood at 19 per cent of parity, the same as on June 15, and 6 points higher than July 1944. Prices of three of the six basic commodities were below parity—wheat at 95 per cent and cotton and peanuts at 90. The general level of prices farmers received for their products in mid-July was 14 per cent above a year earlier, the highest July level since 1929. The index of prices paid by farmers had advanced only 3 points above July, 1944.
