Drying Fruit Suggested As Sugar Saving Method

One way to overcome the short-
age of canning sugar this
season is to dry more fruit for win-
ter use, reminds Lucy A. Case,
extension nutritionist at Oregon
State college. If fruit is allowed
to get fully ripe before drying,
most kinds contain a great deal
of sugar. Many appetizing des-
serts, salads and other dishes can
be made from dried fruit with
the addition of little or no sugar,
she says.
"Dried fruits are less popular
than canned, but they are much
better than none," Miss Case
remarks. "Oregon fruits avail-
able yet this season that can be
successfully dried include
peaches, prunes and pears."

a demolition charge from a bal-

Hayes estimated that about 95

Army authorities denied ru-

bomb disposal team which rushed
to the scene of each reported
landing.

Bombs Prove 'Duds'
Hayes told about a Jackson
county farmer who found an in-
cendiary bomb from a balloon.
He shot at it with a rifle, then
put it in a fire. It didn't go off.

In Coos county a navy plane
shot down a balloon. A farmer
recovered it in the brush, and
dragged it out into the open. It
had all its bombs, but nothing
happened.

Near Burns, a cowboy removed

the balloon.

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Early End Slated for Lend-Lease Projects

WASHINGTON, Aug. 15—
(AP)—All lend-lease projects
based on war needs will be
brought to a close "as rapidly as
possible," the government an-
nounced today.
Leo T. Crowley, Foreign Eco-
nomic administrator, whose
agency administers lend-lease,
said in a statement that lend-
lease would be limited to nations
aiding in the problems of rede-
ployment of U. S. military forces.
"We consider it fair that we
continue lend-lease to these na-
tions, to help offset the expendi-
tures of material and facilities
which they are making in our
behalf," Crowley said.

Postwar Hunt for Bomb Bags Planned

SEATTLE, Aug. 16—(AP)—
The wind-whipped, bomb-carrying
balloons Japan sent to America
in a spirit of wartime giving may
keep searching parties busy after
the last shot is fired in the Pa-
cific, authorities said today, ob-
serving the word of peace may be
slow to reach Nippon's soldiers
but can never reach these paper
missionaries of death.

The problem now, they said, is
to prevent injury or damage from
bombs still undiscovered.
Under consideration is a plan
to send search parties to the
scene of each bomb find and have
them work back over the assumed
bomb route, aided by meteoro-
logical data on prevailing winds.
Approximately 230 were found
during the war, scattered from
Alaska to Mexico. How many
might have fallen unnoticed,
their bombs unexploded, cannot
be guessed.

A flight of hundreds was sighted
off the Aleutians during the
San Francisco United Nations
conference, but not one was
known to have reached shore.
