

Production Boost Possibility From Oregon Land Shown

WASHINGTON, Aug. 15 (AP)—Production of Oregon land could be materially improved with 10,151 man-years of work, says the Agriculture department's soil conservation service.

(A) Many years of work is the estimate of what one man can do in a year.) Since 53,398,000 acres of Oregon's 61,663,000 acres are forest and grazing areas, 4,737 man-years should be devoted to those lands, the service said. Control of dune and beach erosion on the state's shorelands would be aided by planting 3,000,000 shrubs and plants—a 50 man year job.

The state is credited with 3,094,000 acres of prime farming land, 1,861,000 acres suitable for occasional cultivation and 3,612,000 acres usable only for wildlife—land that is rough, swampy or otherwise unsuitable for grazing or forestry.

Largest proposed improvements, in acres include: Contour planting, 1,936,000; crop residue management, 2,086,000; crop rotation, 1,815,000; deferred grazing, 8,548,000; fertilizing grazing land, 1,544,000; proper stocking, 9,309,000; rotation grazing, 10,151,000; salting of grazing lands, 7,605,000; seeding range and pastures, 2,174,000; harvest of woodlands, 3,000,000; prevention of grazing damage, 3,000,000; fire protection, 8,000,000; reorganization of fields, 2,868,000.

Many of the recommended improvements, such as reorganization of fields, require no additional manpower.

More Atom Bombs Were Ready to Blast Nippons

SPOKANE, Wash., Aug. 15 (AP)—Col. Franklin T. Matthias, director of the atomic bomb plant at Richland, Wash., said the United States has more atomic bombs which "could have been dropped" if the Japanese had delayed much longer with their surrender acceptance.

Col. Matthias speculated Japan may have delayed in the belief the United States had only two bombs.

Furthermore, he added, production of the bombs still was in progress and the 5,000 workers at the Richland plant "will produce until ordered to quit."

What is to be done with several by-products of the bomb, which now are being stored, is not known, the colonel said. He added commercial use is "possibly a long way off. All the atoms except hydrogen are exceedingly complex."

No Legal Holidays Until Japs Sign Surrender Terms

WASHINGTON, Aug. 15 (AP)—The White House today retracted a statement that this day and tomorrow are legal holidays and explained that President Truman merely intended to excuse government employees for this period.

Press secretary Charles G. Ross said that last night's state-

ment which held the import of creating two legal holidays for purpose of overtime pay was issued in error. Ross said in a statement:

"Today is not V-J day nor is tomorrow. As the president stated yesterday 'the proclamation of V-J day must wait upon the formal signing of the surrender terms by Japan. Therefore the executive order does not apply in any way to August 15 and 16. August 15 and 16 are not intended to be legal holidays. The president merely excused government employees from work on those two days.

"The executive order will be

applicable on V-J day when it is proclaimed. Before that date the Secretary of Labor will issue a clarifying statement as to its effect.

The executive order that Ross referred to was a decision by Mr. Truman to grant a holiday to war workers with pay when the war is at an official end. It is intended that this will be done when V-J day is formally proclaimed.

Prior to today's clarification, it was generally taken for granted that most war workers would have a two-day lay-off—with pay—along with the government

workers whom Mr. Truman excused from working.

In this connection, War Labor Board chairman George W. Taylor had reiterated that pay angles for war workers excused from working would not conflict with stabilization policy.

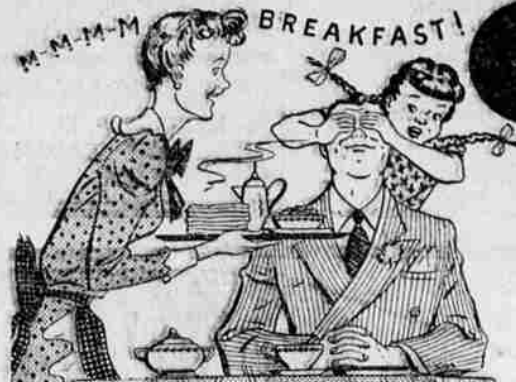
