

Chance to Reduce Portland's Lead Muffed by Seattle

Gloom prevailed the Seattle baseball camp today after the Rainiers' third defeat in four starts against the Los Angeles angels.

Last night's 3-0 loss failed to change the six-and-a-half game spread between the second-place Seattle club and the Pacific Coast league's top-spot Portland Beavers, who dropped a 5-4 decision to the Oakland aces. But time is running out for the Rainiers in their pennant quest, with only 43 games left on the "beavers" schedule, their lead appears more threatened each day.

Excellent pitching featured yesterday's entire slate. Sacramento had the benefit of a three-hitter in taking its fourth straight from the Hollywood stars 2-0, and San Francisco's Seward handcuffed the San Diego Padres with five strikeouts to win 5-1.

The Los Angeles-Seattle contest was a mound duel between the Angels' Cuellar and the Rainiers' Fischer. Cuellar allowed only five hits.

Oakland, with outfielder Hawkins back in the lineup after four weeks of voluntary retirement, beat one of Portland's best hurlers in winning 5-4. Helsar (17-11) was the victim, losing his own game in the fifth by walking in the deciding tally with the bases loaded.

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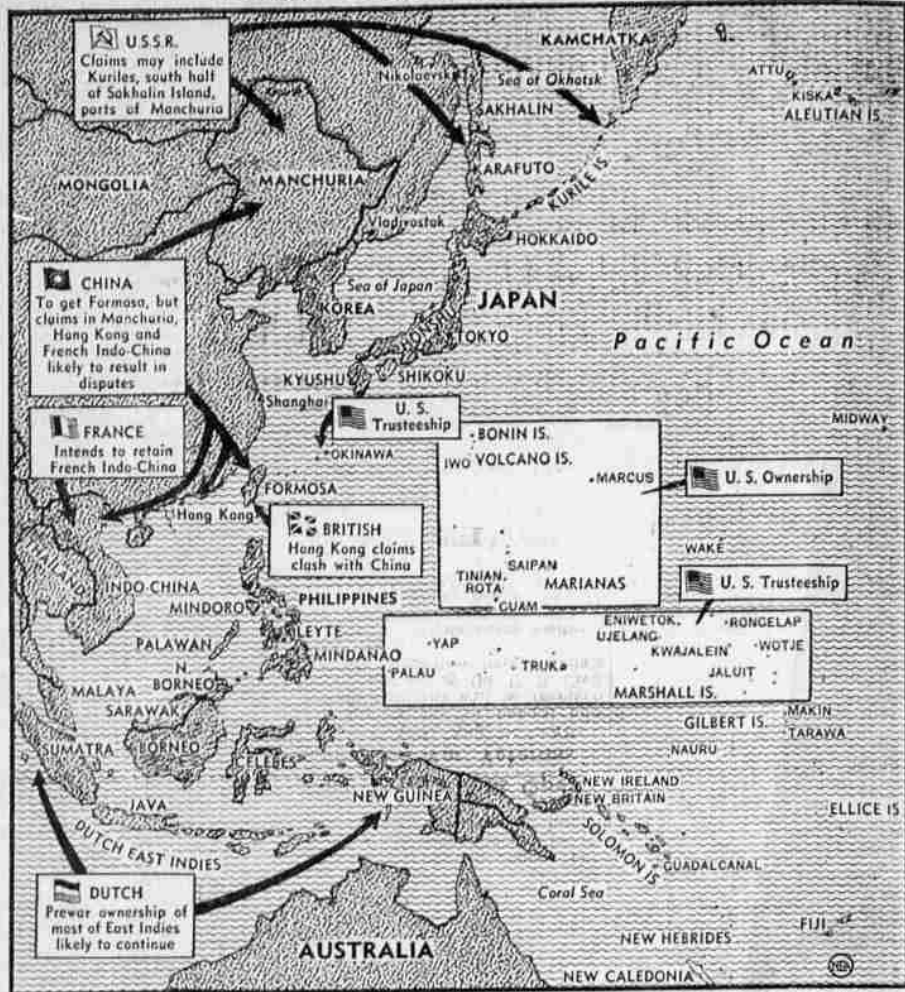
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Territorial Problems Will Follow V-J Day



Some of the territorial problems likely to follow the defeat of Japan are indicated on the map above. Some, such as China's possession of Formosa and retention by the Dutch of sovereignty over most of the East Indies, doubtless will be settled without difficulty. Others, such as conflicting Chinese-Russian interests in Manchuria, those of China and Britain in Hong Kong, and China and France in French Indo-China, may prove extremely difficult. To be settled also will be the status of former Jap mandated islands, although the consensus is that the United States either will be owner or trustee of groups designated on the map.

In separate facilities for women, of whom some 500,000 are expected to require hospitalization, and constructing a sewage disposal plant.

New Charter Asked

In a resolution directed to the Roseburg city council, the directors refer to the rapid increase in industry, business activity and population and urge changes in the present form of municipal government and pledging cooperation in city administration. A new charter is urged to streamline procedure connected with management and improvements.

A committee composed of Kenneth Ford, Horace Berg, Paul Elliott, H. C. Wells and Harold J. Hickerson was named to study park and recreational facility needs. The committee was instructed to prepare an advisory program to be submitted to the directors. It is proposed to outline a detailed plan for park and playground acquisition and development to be offered to the city administration for action.

A committee composed of H. C. Wells, W. C. Holmes, D. N. Bensenbark and H. A. Jacobson was appointed to cooperate with other chambers of commerce in an endeavor to secure improved transportation facilities between central Douglas county and ports of Umpqua and Coos Bay.

will be removed by Christmas. Many will go in a few weeks.

These were other high spots as the swing-over to peacetime living moved ahead:

1. Food officials forecast more food of all kinds for civilians as scheduled army cutbacks go into effect over the next few months. Meat rationing may end next month.

2. There were signs labor and management leaders may have given the administration informal assurances that wartime no-strike, no-lockout pledges will be continued.

3. The War Production board freed tremendous quantities of steel, copper and aluminum for consumer goods.

4. Plans for tax cuts took shape. Secretary of the Treasury Vinson said he hopes for speedy action on a program in preparation.

5. Price controls came off imported wines and distilled spirits such as brandy, rum and cordials. But not whiskies. OPA said items freed had been selling below ceilings.

6. Surplus property officials said hundreds of government-owned war plants would be taken over by private industry during the next few months.

7. WPB Chairman King asked the nation's salvage committees to stay on the job. The need still is great for paper, tin cans and waste fats.

8. Quinine, restricted heretofore for the military's medical needs, is being released to civilians in limited quantities.

225,000 Germans Named On War Criminal List

PRAGUE, Aug. 18.—(AP)—Dr. Bohumil Eger, Czechoslovakia's representative on the International War Crimes commission, said today the names of 225,000 Germans were on the provisional war crimes list. In addition to Nazi leaders, he said, the list includes German financiers and industrialists who helped promote the war.
