## Hager Wins Over Dusette; Franco Trims Davidson

Both victors in the bouts on the weekly wrestling card at the Roseburg armory last Saturday night were outweighed eight pounds. Tex Hager, 182 pounds, defeated Georges Dusette, the 190-pound muscle marvel, and Lou Franco, 176, triumphed over Buck Davidson, 184.

Superior speed and ability to absorb punishment were the chief factors in Hager's victory over Dusette, erstwhile junior heavy champion of the Northwest. It was a three-fall affair, Dusette winning the second one with his deadly full Nelson in 10:11. The first fall in 8:25 with a toe hold, and the third and deciding one in 15:07 with a head scissors after his bulky opponent had been worn to exhaustion in a whirlwind tangle.

Despite his superior poundage, Davidson resorted to all the dirty stuff in his repertoire, and this cost him the bout in the third round on a forfeiture after repeated disobedience of Referee Owen's orders to desist. Buck became belligerent to the referee, who knocked him through the ropes.

Davidson won the first fall of the rough combat in 11:43 with a Boston crab hold. Franco took the second in 11:50 with three Irish whiplashes followed by an arm scissors. The referee's decision in his favor in the third stanza came in 5:37.

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## Beavers' Lead in Flag Race Cut to 4-and-Half Games

(By the Associated Press) It's still a race for first place in the Pacific Coast league.

The picture changed abruptly over the weekend, Portland's Beavers suddenly saw their apparently safe lead melt to four and a half games. The loss of two full tilts from the Beavers' margin was the result of their double defeat Sunday at the hands of the Oakland A's, both by 4-2 scores, while the runner-up Seattle Rainiers were trouncing the Los Angeles Angels 9-5 and 2-0.

For Seattle it was a clean weekend sweep, the Rainiers having won Saturday 7-5 to salvage the series 4-3. The Oaks' twin killing yesterday gave them a 4-2 series split and overcame an edge built up by Portland's 11-2 win Saturday.

Sacramento's Solons firmed their hold on third by beating the Hollywood Stars six out of seven, losing their only contest of the week in Sunday's opener 7-4. Fletcher registered his 21st triumph of the season in pitching the Solons to a 4-0 victory in the nightcap. The Stars lost Saturday 2-1.

**Joyce Wins No. 27**—Joyce almost single-handedly gave the San Francisco Seals their 4-3 series over the San Diego Padres. Joyce won his 27th game in Sunday's curtain raiser 6-2 after shading the Padres early last week. The Seals dropped the finale 9-2 and lost Saturday 2-1.

Portland pitching proved ineffective Sunday against the newly-strengthened Oaks, who beat Liska for the first time this year in the first game and drove Leon, the Beavers' young Cuban hurler, from the mound in the nightcap. In the second contest, with the score tied at two-all, Metro, Oakland outfielder newly acquired from the Philadelphia Athletics, put the tilt on ice with a sixth inning two-run homer. Chetkovich and Hayes were the winning hurlers, Liska and Tising the losers.

**Elliott Scores Shutout**—At Seattle Democrat won No. 16 in beating the Angels 9-5, while Elliott copped the nightcap 2-0 on a four-hitter. The Rainiers jumped on Comellas for seven runs in the first five innings of the opener to clinch the contest. Osborn held Seattle to six hits in the afterpiece but was touched for runs in the fourth and sixth innings.

**Hollywood** came from behind to grab its 7-4 victory in the initial game yesterday against Sacramento, scoring three in the seventh and three more in the eighth to drive Penrose from the hill. Sacramento made only five hits in winning the nightcap 4-0.
