National Forest Timber
For Sale
Sealed bids will be received by
the Forest Supervisor, Roseburg,
Oregon, up to and not later than
2:00 p. m. September 14, 1945, for
all the live timber marked or
designated for cutting and all
merchantable dead timber lo-
cated on an area embracing about
225 acres within Section 1 and
S3 Section 12, T. 27 S., R. 3 E.,
W. M. Brink Area, Umpqua Na-
tional Forest, estimated to be
8,000,000 feet B.M. more or less,
of Douglas-fir, 400,000 feet B.M.
more or less, of western hemlock,
and an unestimated amount of
white fir, western red cedar, Cali-
fornia incense-cedar, ponderosa
pine, sugar pine, and white pine.
No bid of less than \$3.65 per M
feet for Douglas-fir, \$1.25 per M
feet for western hemlock, white
fir, western red cedar, and Cali-
fornia incense-cedar, \$2.75 per M
feet for ponderosa pine, and \$4.75
per M feet for sugar pine and
white pine will be considered. In
addition to the prices bid for the
stumpage, a cooperative deposit
of \$30 per M feet B.M. to be
used by the Forest Service for
paying the cost of slash disposal,
and a cooperative deposit of \$25
per M feet B.M. to cover the cost
of tree planting, seed sowing, and
timber stand improvement work
on the area cut over, for the total
cost of timber under the terms of
the agreement, will be required.
Bids with rates in excess of those
permissible under MPF 460 will
be reduced to the allowable maxi-
mum in making the award.
\$3,000.00 must accompany such
bid, to be applied on the purchase
price, refunded, or retained in
part as liquidated damages, ac-
cording to conditions of sale. The
right to reject any and all bids
is reserved. Before final award
the high bidder will be required
to make a satisfactory showing of
financial ability to carry out
the agreement. Before bids are
submitted, full information con-
cerning the timber, the condi-
tions of sale, and the submission
of bids should be obtained from
the Forest Supervisor, Roseburg,
Oregon, or the Regional Forester,
Portland, Oregon.
