Scouts Stage Own "Feminine" Day, Ascend Mountain

From supper at 8:30 A. M. to breakfast at 6 P. M., Henninger was "queen" of the celebration along with two "princesses" who were also elected by the campers. The "princesses" were Ernest LeBoeuf of troop 68, and Donald Wyatt of troop 9, North Bend. All three were dressed in royal attire, including properly placed Scout neckerchiefs and ferns.
Climax of the day's activities was a "pajama parade" at 8:15 in the evening when the Scouts

competed on the basis of "loudest pajamas," "flashiest pajamas with vertical stripes," "flashiest pajamas with horizontal stripes," largest pajamas and smallest pajamas. C. A. Cummins, camp health director, who is the official leader of a camp song called "Pink Pajamas," also gave special prizes to all Scouts who were wearing "pink pajamas."

Health Institute For Volunteers in Service is Held

The third annual institute for volunteer public health workers and county executive secretaries took place August 13-17 at Pacific university at Forest Grove with Mrs. W. F. Amlot, executive secretary, and Mrs. John Edwards, second vice-president, representing Douglas county. There were 54 enrolled in the institute.

The object of the institute was to give volunteer workers a more comprehensive knowledge of the problems involved in public health work; to study the problems of public relations and organization; to acquaint local workers with current problems in the control of tuberculosis and to discuss the methods of fund-raising employed in the annual Christmas seal sale.

Speakers taking part on the program included: Harold Bishop, state supervisor of health and physical fitness; his assistant, Miss Dorothea Moore; Edward Blomquist, P.A. surgeon, U. S. Public Health service; Oregon State board of health; Irene Carlson, of the National Tuberculosis association seal sale department; C. F. Fleke, state supervisor of vocational rehabilitation service; Walter Giersbach, president of Pacific university; Mary Jane Green, director of health education; Oregon Tuberculosis association; Lola Howard, administrator of State Public Health association; Theresa Jennings, senior assistant nurse officer of T.B. nursing consultant, Oregon State board of health; Fred Schern, director of social hygiene education, Oregon Tuberculosis association; James P. Speros, M.D., director of out-patient department, University state T.B. hospital; and James G. Stone, director of program development of the national association.

Plans were outlined for having the mobile unit visit the various counties this fall to check for tuberculosis. The unit will be in Douglas county in October. The definite date will be announced within two weeks.

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 21 — (AP) — A detective fatally shot Earvin Curtis Jones today after the Negro reportedly fired at the three officers who were trying to question him about a slaying in the Guilds Lake housing project.
Detective Bard Purcell said Jones refused them admittance, and fired at him when ordered to drop his gun.
The detective said he shot Jones as the latter turned to fire at the others. The Negro died without giving officers any information about the death of Beatrice Terry, 37, which was being investigated.

Channel Project Revived in Hearing Dated at Reedsport

The public hearing to be held at Reedsport, Sept. 19, will be a part of a thorough study into the desirability of extensive channel improvements on Smith river, according to a report by Col. Ralph A. Tudor, district engineer. All interested persons are invited to submit information, particularly including data on the nature and extent of improvement desired, with depths and widths of channels; number and type of vessels now in use and which would be accommodated by improvements; annual commerce in tons, terminal facilities, local cooperation, etc.
The study is being made to review a report submitted March 26, 1934. At that time the board of engineers recommended that as benefits would be minor and local in character, no improvement of Smith river should be undertaken by the federal government. The present study is to determine whether benefits have increased to a point which would justify federal development.
The plan of improvement proposes dredging a channel 50 feet wide and four feet deep above the north fork and 100 feet wide and six feet deep below the north fork.

U. S. Control of War-Won Islands In Pacific Urged

WASHINGTON, Aug. 21 — (AP) — Strong congressional backing has lined up behind a house naval committee's recommendation for firmer United States control of Pacific bases than through "gentlemen's agreements."
This country, the committee said, should have at least a working agreement for use of bases on islands held by our own allies as well as by Japan.
Just what congress could do about this was uncertain. But indications are that both Senate and House will be asked soon to go on record as supporting the committee's position and urging the State department to strive for a strong United States hold on any islands needed to keep peace.
If the United States is to discharge her responsibility as keeper of the peace in the Pacific, the committee said, it must have the bases from which to operate. And these bases, the report continued, were taken at great cost in Amer-

ican lives and were built at great cost in American money.

Outright Control Urged
The committee urged outright control by the United States of Japanese-mandated and outlying Japanese-owned islands and retention of "very definite rights" to American bases built on islands controlled by our allies. It withheld until later recommendations as to Formosa, Bombo, Jabit and Yap, still held by Japan.
If the committee's recommendations are followed, United States defense lines in the Pacific will include:
Major fleet bases at Pearl Harbor, Guam, Saipan, Iliilo, Manus and Noumea.
Secondary bases in the Midways, at Okinawa, in Subic bay, and in the Palau islands.
Fleet anchorages at Majuro, Kwajalein, Eniwetok, Truk, Palau and Espiritu Santo.
A main naval air base at Maclean Island.
Land and sea plane bases at Puerto Princessa, Tawi Tawi, Guimaras, Okinawa, in the Kuriles, and Bonins and the Aleutians, at Pearl Harbor, Canton, Johnston, Midway, American Samoa, Tontouta, Magenta, Espiritu Santo, Guadalacanal and Efate.
