Airplane Makers Given Huge Orders

NEW YORK, Aug. 22—(AP)—
Despite the sharpest contraction
in dollar volume ever suffered by
an American industry, the na-
tion's manufacturers held hopes
today of a more than \$1,500,000-
000 output in the next 12 months.
A survey of the country's two
wartime business, coupled with
reports by individual plane mak-
ers to the Securities and Ex-
change commission, showed that
seven companies alone now have
orders for approximately \$1,000-
000,000 on their books.

At the same time, however, a
partial picture of the terrific
shrinkage suffered almost over-
night by aviation producers was
given in reports to the SEC yes-
terday by 13 manufacturers,
showing government contract
cancellations of between \$4,678-
049,752 and \$5,130,049,752.

These figures came from only a
segment of the wartime indus-
try. Airplane production was a
\$16,339,000,000 business last year.
Total contract cancellations were
expected to eat up more than 90
per cent of this 1944 figure.

Job Seekers Flood U. S.

Employment Offices

PORTLAND, Aug. 22—(AP)—
A federal employment service
official estimated today about a
fourth of the men and women
laid off at Portland-Vancouver
area war plants and shipyards
will not seek other jobs.

USES manager James H.
Bagan said about 10 per cent of
3,000 persons who jammed the
office yesterday were placed and
that many sought information

about employment prospects in

other states.
Servicemen job hunters num-
ber about 200 daily, Bagan re-
ported, and the number will dou-
ble in a few weeks.

A laundry union labor recruit-
ing office nearby reported few
workers accepting jobs offered at
62 cents for women and \$1.00 and
\$1.15 for men.

One interview ended when the
man said, "I can't live on that."
Bagan said reports indicate
about 24,000 workers are needed
in Oregon to harvest and process
foods during the next several
weeks.

Series of Ranch Fires

Hits Yoncalla Vicinity

YONCALLA — Yoncalla and
vicinity has had four bad fires
during the past month. First,
the barn on White ranch north
of town burned to the ground
and set afire a field of grain and
tall grass. Then the grain field
owned by Ralph Davis, and leased
by Nobel Snyder caught fire,
while Mr. Snyder was combin-
ing, and about 12 acres were
burned over. A strong wind from
the north kept the Yoncalla fire
fighters busy for more than an
hour, and only by their efforts
was the home of Mr. and Mrs.
Fred Sefton saved. While Minar
Applegate was combining a field
on his ranch east of town, sparks
started a fire, which burned
across the field and up a moun-
tain. However, the damage was
slight. The following week, fire
caused from sparks from a saw-
dust pile at the Hildebrand mill
caused neighbors an hour of hard
fighting to keep it from starting
a forest fire in the Shoestring
country.
