

New Fires Reported in Diamond Lake District

Several new fires in the Diamond lake district of the Umpqua National forest were reported

from local headquarters today by Ray B. Hampton, fire assistant. Two fires, both quickly controlled, were discovered Wednesday. Some of the fires, it was stated, are "sleepers" from electric storms

which occurred Aug. 5 and Aug. 12, and new fires were started early this week by a small storm confined to the Diamond lake region. All were brought under control before causing damage.

There have been 28 fires in the Diamond lake region and 55 for the entire forest, Hampton reports. Acreage burned over totals 135. Five fires are still being controlled but are believed safely confined.

military service, they can roll again.

ODT lifted, also, its ban on trains which run less than 35 per cent full. Some 50 trains may thus be put back.

In some cases, however, the relaxation will be just a paper one. ODT cautioned that some lines simply may not have the cars to spare from hauling soldiers.

Household News Coming

There was more good news. Civilians will be able to buy household appliances months sooner, in most cases, than was expected a month ago.

So disclosing, WPB offered a rough timetable:

Electric ranges by December. Some washing machines by January. Electric fans by Christmas. Refrigerators off rationing by mid-October.

More Hosiery Coming

E. I. DuPont de Nemours company, swinging into large scale peacetime production, promises nylon-starved American women 12 pairs a year.

It won't be long, DuPont said, until we have what amounts to a nylon world. Through years of experience in putting the strong yarn to military uses, the textile industry has learned many new ways of handling the yarn.

Sheer nettings, which proved an invaluable aid against mosquitoes in the tropics, soon will appear in window curtains.

Curtains, dresses, veils and even underwear made of nylon will hold their shape and smoothness through countless laundings, the company added.

Darker Side of Picture

But not everything was rosy on the domestic scene:

First, OPA said the present skimpy sugar rations will last

through 1945. But a Senate group began to plug for smaller shipments overseas.

Second, a congressional inquiry was threatened—by representative Brown (R-Ohio)—if the armed services do not release more doctors to care for civilian

ills.

And a full-fledged row between agencies sprang up on this question: Should postwar homes be under price ceilings?

Fearing sky-high prices on the first new homes, OPA says yes, Hugh Potter, the new construction coordinator, says no. A flood of new home building, he holds, would quash any inflation.

The deadlock may go to President Truman. A quick answer is imperative. Because while the agencies disagree, the government marks time on its program to take the wartime shackles off new home construction.

Price Raises Banned

Later today the OPA said: You'll pay for the new consumer durable goods—like washing machines—the price you would have paid before the war, or very little higher.

This was the rule laid down by the agency to keep prices from getting out of hand. It was one of the most important statements to come from the government in the whole rush to change-over to peace.

OPA boss Bowles said that at pre-war prices for the new durable goods, manufacturers and everyone else down to the retail stores "can look forward to ex-

cellent profits based on a high sales volume."

In its first postwar pricing of consumer durable goods OPA ordered 1942 ceilings on household washing machines, ironers and aluminum kitchen ware.

Bowles said: "So that each family will be able to buy a new washing machine or ironer to fit its needs, its purse and its preference, we are requiring manufacturers to turn out the same proportion of low price units as they made during pre-war years."

Bowles believes washing machines and aluminum kitchen ware should reach the stores in quantity this fall. Production of ironers will be slower.

The advance sale of tickets has been exceptionally good, it is reported. Reedsport Lions and the committee sponsoring the queen contest, already have sold more than \$12,000 worth of tickets.

Roseburg To Be Represented.

A large attendance is anticipated from Roseburg. Riders from the sheriff's posse will participate in the parade. The Roseburg Chamber of Commerce is sponsoring the Roseburg School band, which will be entertained in Reedsport homes during the two-day show. Softball games scheduled for Friday night at Roseburg were canceled, as many of the players will leave Friday evening in order to be present for the opening of the show Saturday morning.

The Reedsport rodeo was started in 1944 after nearly a year of preparation. The Reedsport posse had only \$100 with which to start its work, but took an option on 12 acres of ground, erected an arena, grandstand and all equipment on credit, and staged its first show in the late summer of last year. The event was such an outstanding success that the posse was able to meet all incurred debt, but immediately plunged into new activities to make this year's show bigger and better. End of the war and lifting of gasoline rationing are expected to make the second annual rodeo a record breaker.
