

Changes Made at Junior High And Benson Schools

In order to make more space available for Roseburg Junior High school, increased enrollment and greater efficiency for the education program, the home economics department of sewing and cooking have been combined on the first floor by removing a wall and redecorating room 107, Paul S. Elliott, city school superintendent reports.

This change has made possible a new library room of ample size on the second floor with workroom for a full time librarian. Room 210 has been converted to the 9th grade English class room and is connected to the library by two doors independent of the main hall.

The chorus and band rooms, 312 and 212, have been refurnished with insulation material to reduce interference with other classes carried on at the same time.

The old Senior High science lecture room, number 309, has had the elevators removed and now becomes an additional elementary science classroom usable every period in the day. The former library room now becomes available for one large classroom or two small ones if necessary.

With the installation of a hot lunch program kitchen in room 211, all regular class rooms except two have been removed from the highway side of the building; thus reducing interference caused by heavy hauling diesel trucks.

Improvements at Benson By the installation of modern cloak rooms and storage space in each of the eight classrooms in the Benson school, the out-moded large cloak rooms have been combined with office and storage space to increase the building's capacity to 11 rooms, Supt. Elliott reports.

The conversion has doubled the auditorium capacity of the building by the use of folding doors. All new rooms have been redecorated.

"While the building has been increased in size," says Elliott, "and can now accommodate 350 pupils, we have not solved the problem of increased play space, rest room accommodations, drinking fountains, or lunch room facilities. We hope to rectify each of these in turn as quickly as possible."

"In Fullerton and Rose schools we shall undoubtedly have to use the stage rooms for class rooms, thus moving the music classes to the main auditorium."

New furniture has been purchased for the extra rooms through the Roseburg Book Store. The equipment is available and is now in transit, Elliott has been advised.

CIO, In Reverse, Now Wants WLB To Stay on Job

WASHINGTON, Aug. 23.—(AP)—The CIO, frequent harsh critic of the War Labor board during the war, finds itself in the position of being the major contender for WLB's continuation.

The AFL wants the board to fold up as quickly as possible and restore collective bargaining. The federation contends absence of the war emergency removes the boards' power of plant seizure and shatters its prestige.

The administration and public and industry members of the board have expressed, privately or publicly, similar opinions.

But the CIO thinks WLB's services are definitely needed for the critical reconversion days facing the nation and that disputes are going to arise requiring intervention by a three-party agency. Already the CIO's biggest union, the auto workers, has started drives at General Motors and Chrysler plants for 30 per

cent higher wages. And CIO President Philip Murray said last week it would be "reasonable to assume" that the 80 per cent of all CIO unions which have contract reopening clauses in the event of a government wage policy change will throw them open for pay negotiations.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 23.—(AP)—The Army is banning overseas shipment of enlisted men with 75 or more discharge points.

At the same time, it was learned that the War department soon will direct all branches of the Army to cut below 37 the age limit for overseas duty.

At present, the ground forces are screening out of divisions slated for Japanese occupation duties all men 37 or older. The ground forces embrace all troops, including the infantry, except those in the service or air forces.

The latter two now are weeding out of redeployed units all men 38 or older.

Just how far the age limit may be reduced has not been determined. One problem is that men in the service forces, chiefly supply troops, are older on the average than those in the ground and air forces.
