Lethal Effects of Rays From Atomic Bombs Explained

NEW YORK, Aug. 23—(AP)—The Japanese who were reported yesterday by Tokyo radio to have died mysteriously a few days after the atomic bomb blasts probably were victims of a phenomenon which is well known in the great radiation laboratories of America.

They died from the after-effects of rays created at the instant of the explosion. Most of these rays do not linger on in the air for more than a few moments after the flash.

Two kinds of burns were made by these rays. One is the ordinary, or X-ray, burns, familiar to physicians. These are always delayed burns. When a person touches a hot stove, the burn is instantaneous. When he gets sunburned, the burn does not show up for two or three hours.

X-ray and gamma ray burns show up on the skin. Their effects finally are the same on the skin as burns of ordinary fire. In addition there is internal burning. Its effects also delayed.

More likely as the cause of the delayed Japanese deaths are the effects of a different kind of rays, those which are made by a "beam" of concentrated neutrons.

Test Made on Animals
At Berkeley at the University of California radiation laboratory this sort of ray had been produced by a cyclotron, so that it is visible. It is about five feet long, a few inches in diameter, its color a pale, electric blue.

This ray is considered probably almost instantly lethal. Animals were exposed to neutron rays much less concentrated than this picturesque laboratory exhibit. The concentration of neutrons upon the animals was like the concentrated rays that might occur near a reactor in the explosion of the atomic bomb.

The animals died in a few days. They were not apparently much harmed at first. They died because the neutron rays had destroyed a lot of their white blood corpuscles. This may be the cause of delayed death described in the Tokyo radio.

Reactions Exposed
These neutron rays were most likely in the air. It is likely that the neutrons streaming from the bomb flash struck particles of earth and caused them to emit their own streams of neutrons, temporarily. Thus if the temperature of the ground lasted as long as a day, which would be a long time for such induced secondary activity, Japan, gone into the center of the area on atomic missions, might receive a serious neutron damage to their bodies from the earth.

The outstanding fact about all these rays is the ease with which they are produced and the ease with which they can be directed toward the point of harmlessness. The particles either of air or earth the neutrons hit may continue to give off the secondary rays, but only in most cases for a few seconds to a few hours. And there some atoms will continue to emit rays for months.

Probably no one knows precisely the volume of either the rays coming from the flash of an atomic bomb or of the later, long-lasting particles of temporary radioactive and neutron rays, active air and earth. But in the much smaller forces released in the atomic fires in the Washington plutonium plant, the atoms of at least 30 different chemical elements become temporarily ray-producing.

Job Security For War Veterans Will Be Maintained

WASHINGTON, Aug. 24—(AP)—Gov. Herbert O'Connor of Maryland said yesterday that President Truman has some legislative recommendations in mind to protect war veterans from any termination of the selective service law security clause.

O'Connor called at the White House and said he expressed great concern to Mr. Truman over the address in Boston by Maj. Gen. Hershey, selective service director, in which Hershey

said war veterans would lose their legal right to their peace-time civilian jobs when Congress declares an end to hostilities. The governor said the job security clause should be continued. It returning servicemen are not afforded the advantages of this clause, he added, it would be the "worst evidence of ingratitude on the part of the American people."

O'Connor said the veterans' greatest need will be when demobilization reaches its peak and if the job security clause were terminated it would be "very upsetting to a great number of men."
