Oscar J. Lindsey, 68, well-known resident of Douglas county and retired Roseburg groceryman, died at his home in West Roseburg this morning following a prolonged period of illness. He was born in Columbia county, Tennessee, April 10, 1877, and came to Roseburg when he was sixteen years old. He was married to Miss Lulu Hawn June 20, 1906. Mr. Lindsey was engaged as storekeeper for the Southern Pacific company at Roseburg for a number of years before entering the grocery business, in which he was engaged for about twenty years.

He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Lulu Lindsey of Roseburg, and one son, Corporal Harry Orville Lindsey, U. S. Army, now stationed at Spokane, Washington. Funeral services will be held in the chapel of the Douglas Funeral home Thursday afternoon at 2 o'clock. Concluding services and interment will follow in the L. O. O. F. cemetery.

Bomber With 15 Aboard Missing in Washington

WALLA WALLA, Aug. 27.—(AP)—Col. G. A. Whatley, commanding officer of the Fourth air force base here, said yesterday a B-24 Liberator bomber with 15 men aboard, on a training flight from Sioux Falls, S. D., was missing approximately 75 miles southeast of here.

One plane of the group returned safely although damaged in flight and another crash landed at Butte, Mont., without injury to its crew. Names of the men in the missing plane were not released.

Portland's Lead Over Seattle Cut To Three Games

(By The Associated Press) Three games apart, Portland's faltering Beavers and Seattle's challenging Rainiers are headed today for a two-week stay in California that may be the deciding factor in the Pacific Coast league pennant race.

With four weeks left in the season, current first division teams appear sure to keep their foursome intact for the governor's playoff. But in what positions they will finish is still uncertain.

Seattle, playing championship ball, is a definite threat to the Beavers, who have won only 10 games in the last 23 while the Rainiers were copying 14 out of 21. The Northwesters have the one-two berths clinched.

Third-place Sacramento, 10 1/2 games behind Seattle, is being closely pressed by the San Francisco Seals, who pulled within half a game of the Solons by beating them five out of seven last week. Only team with an outside chance of entering the upper bracket is Oakland, which is trailing the Seals by six tilts.

Portland wound up in a 4-4 series tie with the Los Angeles Angels losing three straight over the weekend, 7-0 Saturday, and 8-6, and 1-0 Sunday. The Rainiers, after sweeping four straight from Oakland, also had weekend difficulties, dropping Saturdays encounter 4-1 and gaining a split yesterday. The Oaks took the curtain raiser 5-4 and lost the nightcap 4-3.

San Francisco made it two out of three over Sacramento in the last two days, winning Saturday 6-2 and dividing Sunday's twin bill 11-4 and 2-10. San Diego's Padres salvaged their series with the Hollywood Stars 4-3 by taking Saturday's game 6-4 and breaking even Sunday 6-8 and 3-1.

Pulford Loses Duet—Roy Pulford (18-12) was charged with Portland's 8-6 defeat in the first game Sunday, being unable to hold the Angels after he was spotted to a 5-2 lead in the first three innings. Relief pitcher Woodend drove in three runs in helping get credit for the win. The Beavers' Pulford, who has been out of the lineup for two weeks with an ailing flipper, was beaten 1-0 in the finale although he held the Seraphs to four hits. Osborn issued only five safeties in blanking the league leaders.

Seattle's four-run rally in the last two innings of the opener was not enough to overcome Oakland's five-run lead. With the score tied 3-3 in the last frame of the abbreviated nightcap, the Oakland infield fell apart allowing the Rainiers to load the bases and score their winning run on Dobbins' single.

Sacramento's rookie pitcher, Valva, 19, suffered his initial defeat in three starts in losing to San Francisco 11-4 yesterday. The Solons evened things up in the second game as Fletcher registered his 22nd triumph of the season 10-2.

Hollywood scored eight runs, four of them unearned, off Knowles and Brillheart in the eighth inning to beat San Diego, 8-6 in their curtain raiser. The Padres came back in the finale 3-1 to give Carl Dumbler his 19th victory.

Hager Wins Over Lipscomb; Poggi is Victor Over Olson

Superior speed and cleverness, coupled with absorption of the type of punishment prohibited in the book of rules, enabled Tex Hager, in the weekly wrestling bill at the Roseburg armory last Saturday night, to defeat Jack Lipscomb, current edition of the Pacific Northwest junior heavy-weight championship. Lipscomb won the first fall in 12:22 with a Boston crab hold and dropped the second round in 8:24 when Referee Elton Owen disqualified him for repeated fouling.

Lipscomb opened hostilities in the third round without awaiting the sound of the gong, but Tex met him at his own game, wore him down in a hurricane fashion and clamped on a finishing head scissors in 6:44.

In the semi-final, Gorilla Poggi, a 185-pound, bald-headed importation from Argentina, disposed of Milton Olson, 176 pounds, in two straight falls. A half Boston crab decided the first round in 14:10, and a series of body slams and a press decided the second in 18:40. The burly Argentine threw Olson out of the ring onto the floor three times during the engagement and on another occasion both tumbled out, with the lighter man getting the worst of it. They are billed to resume their feud on a Portland program tonight. Lipscomb will be in the headliner, with Ernie Piluso as his opponent.
