Americans Flood Canada As Gas Rationing Ends

OTTAWA, Aug. 25.—(AP)—The end of gasoline rationing has boomed tourist traffic in Canada to prewar proportions. From coast to coast, steak-hungry Americans are swarming across the border to eat meat, catch fish and enjoy the scenery.

A survey today by the Canadian Press at various border points disclosed motor traffic from the United States in some cases was four times as great as before Aug. 15, when rationing was lifted.

Tourist bureaus are busy trying to find accommodation for the influx of visitors, most of whom say they are traveling "as far as the tires will carry us."

Four Negro Paratroopers Hurt in Jump at Fire

SEATTLE, Aug. 25.—(AP)—A forest fire at Chilliwak lake in Whatcom county was being checked last night by 41 paratroopers who parachuted at the fireline Wednesday. Forest service officials said. Four negro paratroopers were injured in the jumping and were rescued by a coast guard plane after another aircraft had flown first aid to the wounded soldiers. The fire covered 500 acres.

5 QUESTION: It's all very well to want to can—but isn't it a rather tough proposition for the average woman to undertake?

ANSWER: It's actually easier than you think! And this year, canning equipment will be more plentiful.

6 QUESTION: Will there be enough pressure canners?

ANSWER: There have been more pressure canners manufactured this year, and they aren't rationed.

7 QUESTION: Suppose I can't buy a pressure canner—or even borrow one?

ANSWER: Your local newspaper may be able to direct you to a community canning center.

8 QUESTION: Here's the \$64 question: Sugar?

ANSWER: Your local War Price and Rationing board will allow extra sugar needed for canning up to 10 pounds per person. And remember, home economics experts from the staffs of national women's magazines and city newspapers stand ready to help with special sugar-saving canning recipes. Consult them for this extra wartime help!

9 QUESTION: Say, it does look as if home canning might be more important this year. But what do I can?

ANSWER: The excess from your Victory Garden. Or fresh vegetables and fruits in season. Northwest crops—with a few minor exceptions—are bountiful this year! (Can all you can—nutrition standards call for at least four and, if possible, six to seven servings of fruits and vegetables every day.)

10 QUESTION: All right, you've definitely interested me in home canning. But...I'm not quite up on my canning technique. What do I do?

ANSWER: Easy! City, state and federal agencies are standing by to help you. Women's pages of your local newspapers will prove a tremendous help throughout the canning season. The Home Economics department of your state agricultural college will dispense the latest tested procedures. And the U. S. Department of Agriculture will be glad to send you numerous helpful bulletins! Your bookstore can supply you easy-to-read volumes on canning; or you can read the same information at the nearest public library.
