Jobs Question Still Snag in Reconversion

this still seemed insufficient, the government could ask Congress to create jobs at Federal expense. However, the pending bill by itself involves no Federal spending. Chairman Wagner of the Senate group that is hearing testimony on this proposal, said today he thinks a further cut in the workweek, perhaps to 36 hours, is "probably necessary to assure full employment in the years ahead."

A House committee has approved a bill to abolish the three-man surplus property board and to put one man in charge of the task of selling billions of dollars worth of unwanted government goods and property. That gives the House a chance to vote on it soon.

Home Costs at Issue
Now for the news outside of Congress: Homes—Builders are aroused over a proposal under consideration for the government to control prices of new home construction. The National Association of Home Builders has asked its members to shower President Truman with protests.

Corporations—The Securities and Exchange commission said corporations have ample funds for the task of reconversion and expansion. The SEC estimated that 47 billion dollars in available corporate wealth, after allowing for taxes and other deductions, is available for investment.

More goods for you—The WPB has started a survey of all the major manufacturing industries to find out when their peacetime products will be available in quantity. In many instances, WPB officials just don't know, and some predictions have been vague.

Film for snapshots—There should be a good deal of it by October 1.

Cameras—A pretty good supply of simple ones by Christmas. Complicated ones later.

Typewriters—Over 120,000 expected to be produced by Jan. 1. But commercial firms have ordered them in advance. You may have to wait.

Leather—WPB removed restrictions on using leather in a lot of things like luggage, belts, and wallets. WPB said there's enough leather now to increase shoe production "substantially and rapidly." OPA said rationing will end when WPB says production is fast enough to meet the nation's needs. It's your guess.

John M. Spancake Of Dixonville Dies

John Mason Spancake, 64, well-known resident of Douglas county, died suddenly last night at his home on the Dixonville road. He was born at Pine Grove, Pa., Jan. 13, 1881, and came to Roseburg about 30 years ago, making his home here for several years. He then moved to Portland, returning to Roseburg in 1919. Mr. Spancake was one of the oldest Douglas county employes, having worked for the county for about 25 years. He was a member of Aerie 1497, Fraternal Order of Eagles.

Surviving are his widow, Mrs. Maud L. Spancake, Roseburg, and two children, Mrs. Carrie Felty, Lebanon, Pa., and Robert Spancake, Roseburg. He is also survived by two sisters, Mrs. Emma Fassell and Miss Mildred Spancake, both of Harrisburg, Pa., and by four grandchildren.

Funeral services will be held in the chapel of the Douglas Home Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock, conducted by the Rev. H. P. Scone of the First Baptist church. Concluding services will be conducted by the Eagles lodge at Civil Bend cemetery.

of Germany after the reported death of Hitler.

Other Bigwigs on List
The list also includes the following: Joachim von Ribbentrop, former champagne salesman who directed Nazi intrigue in half a dozen European capitals as German's foreign minister.

Robert Ley, chief of the Nazi party organization, commissioner for national housing, and chief of the German labor front.

Alfred Rosenberg, Reich leader for ideology and foreign policy and propagandist who took leading role in anti-Semitism in Germany.

Hans Frank, who was governor general of Poland and an S. S. general.

Ernst Kaltenbrunner, Hitler's right hand man, chief of the Reich security department and chief of criminal police.

Wilhelm Frick, minister of interior and ruler of Bohemia and Moravia. He served in Hitler's secret cabinet council.

Julius Streicher, gauleiter of Franconia, editor of Der Sturmer, notorious anti-Semite and a schoolmaster by profession.

Dr. Walter Funk, president of the Reichbank.

Hjalmar Schacht, minister of economics, commissioner of the four-year plan, and former president of the Reichbank.

Baldur von Schirach, chief of the Reich youth movement and ruler of Vienna.

Fritz Sauckel, manpower commissioner.

Albert Speer, chief of the Todt organization, which used slave labor.

Franz von Papen, former ambassador to Austria and Turkey.

Col. Gen. Alfred Gustav Jodl, chief of staff of the Wehrmacht.

Constantin von Neurath, Reich minister of foreign affairs until 1938, "protector" of Bohemia and Moravia for two years, and president of the secret cabinet council.

Dr. Arthur Seyss-Inquart, commissioner for the occupied Netherlands.

Admiral Erich Raeder, inspector of the German navy and commander in chief of the Navy from 1928 until 1943.

Hans Fritzsche, chief of the German radio propaganda service.

Gustav Krupp von Bohlen und Halbach, war industrialist.

Trials Stated in October
The list was drawn up by the chief war crimes prosecutors for the United States, Britain, France and Russia. The United States representative is Justice Robert H. Jackson.

The trial probably will get under way early in October in a little courtroom at Nuernberg. A number of leading nazis already have been lodged in the jail courthouse, where they will be joined soon by Hess. A spokesman for Jackson said some of the group were in Russian hands.

A statement of the four prosecutors said that "investigations are going forward of cases of other war criminals who have not been included in this list."
