

Beavers Defeat Padres; Turpin Wins Over Solons

(By the Associated Press)
Portland power and Seattle pitching left those two top Pacific Coast league teams still three games apart today after both won opening games of their final California sojourn last night.

The circuit-pacing Beavers smashed out a 13-1 victory over a demoralized San Diego club while the Rainiers coasted to a 5-1 decision over the Sacramento Solons behind Hal Turpin's seventh-inning hurrying.

The Solons' defeat dropped them into a third-place tie with the idle San Francisco Seals, who open against the Los Angeles Angels today.

Oakland's A's, straining for a first division spot, found the tail-end Hollywood Stars easy pickings, winning 8-2. The triumph moved the Oaks to within five and a half games of the Seals-Solons combination.

Padres Go to Pieces
Portland jumped into an early

lead over San Diego's Padres, counting once in the first and four times in a second-inning outburst that was capped by O'Neill's triple. Outfielder Gullie's two-run homer in the fifth sent Padre starter Ferguson to the showers. San Diego literally disintegrated in the sixth, when four walks by relief pitcher Morales, an error, three fielder's choices and a scratch hit by Manager Owen accounted for five Beaver tallies. Mooty limited the Padres to five scattered singles.

Turpin's 5-1 victory over the Solons was his 15th of the season. The Rainiers, leading by only one run, clinched the game in the first of the ninth when they scored three times to break up a tight pitching duel between Turpin and Joe Wood, Jr. First Baseman McDonald tripled in two runs and then raced home as Second Baseman Handley threw the ball into the backstop on a play at the plate. The two teams will play a nine-game series this week, with a twin bill scheduled tonight.

Battle Royal to Open Mat Card Here Saturday

Jack Lipcomb, the Pacific coast king of junior heavyweight wrestlers, still refuses to post his belt in a match against smaller, but more aggressive Tex Hager, Roseburg's brand-new grappling resident. Hager surprised northwest mat circles last Saturday night by defeating Lipcomb in a non-title match, after the Hoosier "Hot Shot" was threatened with suspension unless he accepted the bout. And now the Indiana villain claims that he is not obligated to meet Hager in a return match because he lost the decision on a technicality—a foul.

Matchmaker Don Owen, hoping to feature a Hager-Lipcomb championship tilt here next week, has compensated by booking a five-man "battle royal" with the winner collecting the entire \$200 purse, plus expenses. Hager has been signed for the free-for-all along with the other winner here last Saturday—Gorilla Poggi.

The South American will be a top contender for the battle royal title, although it will be his first experience with wrestling's greatest extravaganza. His ruggedness, displayed here last week, indicates he will do well in a knock-out and drag-out affair.

Owen, although he has not signed the other three contenders, promises the remainder of the field will be composed of top-flight matmen.

The five-man affair is expected to attract a capacity crowd for the three-in-one battle. Battle royals call for all five matmen to enter the ring simultaneously, the contenders battling continually until only two rivals remain on their feet, having escaped either being knocked out or having their shoulders pinned to the mat. The first man out will be eliminated, but the next two ousted will return for a one-fall engagement for a minor cash award. The two finalists will clash for the handsome \$200 purse over the best-two-out-of-three route.

return to Wedemeyer's home and relax.

He told correspondents: "Major Disaster Avoided
"I imagine most of you know the circumstances over which I had no control—and in order to avoid what would have been a far greater disaster—I was forced on May 6, 1942, to tender to Lt. Gen. Homma of the Japanese army the surrender of my forces in the Philippines.

"My gallant troops had perhaps made a defense against more overwhelming odds under more disadvantageous circumstances than troops of the American Army had ever been confronted with in history.

"Following the fall of Corregidor I was first moved to Manila, then to a prison camp in the Philippine islands, thence to three different camps.

Russian Aid Acknowledged
"About 10 days ago I was contacted in the prison camp, roughly in central Manchuria, by an American officer, one of a small team which Gen. Wedemeyer had very generously sent to get in touch with us. We had a great deal of difficulty getting out of that little place. In fact, we finally got out under an escort provided by some Russian troops, and from there we were able to join some 1,500 to 1,600 American officers and enlisted men concentrated in Mukden.

"I don't feel at liberty to go into the details of the campaigns of Luzon, Bataan and Corregidor until I have made my report to the War department.

was ample time to have accomplished this.

"(D) To investigate and determine the state of readiness of the Hawaiian command between November 27 and December 7, 1941, despite the impending threat of war."

Mr. Truman said in part: "Certain criticisms of the chief of staff, General Marshall, appear in the report of the Army Pearl Harbor board. You will notice in the Secretary of War's statement that he takes sharp issue with the criticism of Gen-

eral Marshall, stating that the criticism is 'entirely unjustified.' The conclusion of the Secretary of War is that General Marshall acted throughout this matter with his usual 'great skill, energy and efficiency. I associate myself wholeheartedly with this expression by the Secretary of War.

"Indeed, I have the fullest confidence in the skill, energy and efficiency of all our war leaders, both Army and Navy."

Stimson Comments
Short and Kimmel were the Army and Navy commanders at Pearl Harbor when the Japanese struck their surprise blow there. Admiral Stark was chief of naval operations at the time.

In this report Secretary Stimson said that while Admiral Kimmel and General Short "were on very friendly terms and in frequent communication, the exchange of information as well as consultation in other respects at Hawaii between the Army and Navy was inadequate."

Stimson declared that the underlying cause of the error of judgment which permitted the sneak attack "was General Short's confidence that Japan would not then attack Pearl Harbor."

The secretary asserted that since the war plans division and other activities of the general staff were under the general direction of Marshall, the Army Pearl Harbor board had been led to criticize Marshall as being responsible "for some of the shortcomings of the officers of the general staff."

The Pearl Harbor board attributed the extent of the Pearl Harbor disaster primarily to what it called failure of the commanding general of the Hawaiian department "adequately to alert his command for war," and to failure of the War department to direct him to take an adequate alert and to keep him advised on developments of the United States-Japanese peace talks then under way.

Kimmel, Stark Relegated
On the Navy side, Secretary Forrestal directed that Kimmel and Stark, both retired, shall not hold positions in the Navy which require "the exercise of superior judgment."

He said that on the basis of the record and the investigations, he had reached the conclusion that Kimmel and Stark "particularly from the period of November 27 to December 7, 1941, failed to demonstrate the superior judgment necessary for exercising command commensurate with their rank and their assigned duties."

Forrestal's report embraced an assertion by the commander-in-chief of the U. S. fleet concluding that: "The derelictions on the part of Admiral Stark and Rear Admiral Kimmel were faults of omission rather than commission," and added:

"Since trial by general court-martial is not warranted by the evidence adduced, appropriate administrative action would appear to be the relegation of both of these officers in positions in which lack of superior judgment may not result in future errors."

Veiled Thrust at Hull
Stimson not only disagreed with the Pearl Harbor board's criticism of Marshall but also with what he termed a suggestion in the board's report "which might be construed as a criticism" of former Secretary of State Cordell Hull.

was achieved the call went out over the loudspeaker system: "Sweepers man your brooms. Sweep clean fore and aft."

Jubilant has been apparent at many of the "POW" camps. Carrier plane pilots who have been circling the areas constantly and dropping food said this morning that several of the camps are displaying American flags.

Japanese medical officers promised that when occupation forces land, 6,125 prisoners of war and 94 civilian internees would be released in the Tokyo area.

Other Nippons Give Up
Announcements of new Japanese surrenders trickled in from Pacific islands.

Old Glory flew over Mill atoll in the Marshalls after the surrender of the surviving 2,400 Nipponese of an original garrison of 3,500. Two-hundred marines occupied the atoll which has long been a bomb practice target for carrier and marine pilots.

Eight-thousand other Japanese capitulated on Morotai, a MacArthur stepping stone to the Philippines, and nearby, by-passed Halmahera.

The American flag was raised

at Atsugi yesterday, shortly after the advance party landed. No Japanese flag was flying.

Minor Incidents Forecast
Three thousand Japanese marines, armed with baseball bats, guarded the Atsugi airdrome where the American flag was hoisted yesterday. They were assigned to keep back crowds and prevent possible incident.

A Tokyo newspaper commented that occupation could be expected to bring "such trifles as occasional violence."

"As a precaution against danger," Yokosuka authorities ordered residents in most sections of the city to remain indoors during tomorrow's landings. Vehicular traffic was prohibited.

Tokyo protested to MacArthur against the "state of confusion" in Soviet-occupied Northern Korea, rife with "looting, kidnapping, murder."
