which the committees will continue to handle, including commodity loans, crop insurance, and production payments on milk, butterfat, beef and sheep. It is expected that some additional functions may be added to the committees' work as the reorganization plan is put into operation.

The new organization consolidates as a number of previously separate offices, all concerned with production and marketing. State and county farmer committees become a part of the Field Services branch of the new Production and Marketing administration, and as such will continue to serve as the means through which Federal farm programs are put into action on the farm, Taylor explained.

"Until reorganization reaches the state and county levels, we will still operate as AAA committees," the chairman said. "When the changes are made, it appears that not only will farmer committees be continued, but they may have added responsibilities and authority for dealing with production and marketing problems."
