

Three Teams Tied For Second Place In Softball Race

With the league pennant safely tucked in their pocket, Dunham's softballers relaxed last night and allowed themselves to be beaten 5 to 3 as the result of a flock of seventh-inning errors. At the same time, the Elks' decision to Sutherland, 11 to 7, putting all three teams, Sutherland, Olympia and the Elks club, in a tie for

second place, each with four wins and five losses for the second half of the season.

Dunham's winners of both flights in the split season and holders of the league title, with six wins and three losses, will meet a team of league All-Stars in a special game to be played Friday night, winding up league play for this year.

Rally in 7th Wins
In the first game last night, Dunham's had Olympia Supply down 3 to 1 going into the seventh and last inning. But six errors, two of them scoring errors, allowed the Olympians to push four runs across the plate in the first of the seventh.

Elks club players, faced with ceiling position should they be beaten by Sutherland, really teed off on the offerings of Yang and Cole. Five home runs, one triple and a couple of doubles were included in the Elks' 13 hits. The lodgemen were aided by five Sutherland errors.

Games last night concluded the regular schedule for the year, and the only remaining game is the exhibition Dunham's All-Star contest Friday night, when the Transfarmers will face a team picked from the best players of the three other teams of the league.

Portland's Lead Over Rainiers Cut To Game-and-Half

The onrushing Seattle Rainiers zoomed to within a game and a half of the kingpin Portland Beavers today in one of the hottest first-place battles the Pacific Coast league has seen in years.

The Rainiers cut Portland's previous threehit lead in half last night by sweeping a doubleheader from the Sacramento Solons 2-1 and 5-0 as the Beavers were losing 9-3 to the San Diego Padres.

This is the closest Seattle has been to the pacesetters since June 14, when the two teams were separated by the same margin. On Aug. 5 Portland paced the pack by eight games and apparently had the 1945 title clinched. Then the weary Beavers began slipping and have won only 17 out of their last 25 games while the driving Rainiers were taking 17 out of 24. Portland has 30 games to play before the season ends; Seattle 31.

Joyce Blanks Angels

While interest centered on the fight for first, the San Francisco Seals slipped into third place two tilts ahead of Sacramento by whipping the Los Angeles Angels 3-0 and 4-3. Joyce registered his 29th victory of the season in the opener with a threehit performance.

Oakland made it two straight over Hollywood Stars 12-1 to advance within four games of the first division.

Elliott Huris Shutout

Seattle's 2-1 decision over Sacramento in the curtain raiser gave Demoran his 12th consecutive triumph and 18th of the year. Scheduled for seven innings, the game went into two extra frames before Norbert smashed out a home run to give the Rainiers

their winning tally. Fletcher, the Solon's 22-game ace, was charged with the loss, his 12th. Glenn Elliott's live-hit hurling gave Seattle the nightcap 5-0.

San Diego drove Liska off the mound in crushing Portland 9-3 as Eaves was notching his 19th win of the season. The defeat, Liska's 10th, prevented the veteran righthander from being the circuit's third pitcher to break into the 20-win circle.

Only 30 Men Faced

Joyce faced only 30 men in winning the San Francisco-Los Angeles series opener 3-0. He never gave up a base on balls and held the Angels to a double and two singles in tossing one of his best games of the season. Third sacker Perry drove in two of the Seals' three runs, and then proved the hero of the 4-3 extra-inning abbreviated finale by doubling in the first of the eighth to score Sanders with the deciding tally.

Oakland ran roughshod over Hollywood for the second night in a row 12-1. Manager Raimondi sparked the Oaks' attack with three hits in five trips to the plate, one of them a home run inside the park. Gilmore, winning pitcher, held the Stars to seven safeties and blanked them until the ninth inning.

Salvage Ends Sept. 30 Except as to Used Fat

PORTLAND, Aug. 29.—(AP)—The head offices of the salvage division—the War Production board department which has collected old papers, cans, and fats—will close Sept. 30.

Claude I. Sersanous, chairman of the State Salvage committee, said he expected all Oregon's volunteer salvage committees to halt work on the same date.

He said, however, that some salvage would still be needed. The used fat collection—giving housewives red points and cash for fats—will continue under the Commodity Credit corporation's direction.

Atom Bomb Makes Navies, Armies Obsolete—Cordon

PORTLAND, Aug. 29.—(AP)—Senator Guy Cordon told businessmen here that atomic bombings have made armies and navies obsolete and that any wars of the future would be fought by robot-controlled airpower.

"The whole pattern of social relationships underwent the greatest change ever experienced," Cordon said, "when the atomic bomb burst over Hiroshima."

Schwellenbach Supports Work Assurance Bill

WASHINGTON, Aug. 29.—(AP)—"The country cannot afford to 'risk the chance' of wide unemployment by a hands-off policy on the part of the government on job controls, Secretary of Labor Schwellenbach said today. He told a senate banking subcommittee he was in full accord with the principles of the Wagner-Murray job assurance measure, and criticized those groups which, he said, believe it is 'economically desirable to have a large pool of unemployment upon which to draw.'"

Every private device to attain full employment should be used first, he said, and only when that fails should public devices be used.

Mrs. W. Kaiser Of Melrose Passes

Mrs. Willmina Kaiser, 87, well-known resident of Roseburg, died last night following a long period of ill health. She was born in Berlin, Germany, September 17, 1858, and came to Canada when she was thirteen years old, residing there for four years before coming to the United States. She was married to William F. Kaiser at Madison, Wis., in 1876. Mr. Kaiser died several years ago. Mrs. Kaiser came to Douglas county about 57 years ago, making her home in the Melrose district for many years.

Surviving are five children: A. John Kaiser, Melrose; Charles Kaiser, Roseburg; William P. Kaiser, Applegate, Oregon; Mrs. Minnie Burt, Oakland, Oregon, and Mrs. Anna East, Idaho City, Idaho; five grandchildren, and two great-grandchildren.

Funeral services will be held in the chapel of the Douglas Funeral home Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock. Dr. Charles A. Edwards officiating. Concluding services and interment will follow in Melrose cemetery.
