Celebrates 90th Birthday

Lars A. Ueland, one of Roseburg's most prominent residents, celebrated his 90th birthday Friday, August 24 at his home at 1459 Harrison street, by receiving old friends calling to congratulate him upon the occasion. Three of his daughters were present for the occasion including: Miss Alice Ueland, Roseburg senior high school mathematics instructor who makes her home with her father; Miss Cora Ueland, of Los Angeles, and Mrs. Edith Knollin, of Eugene.

Old family friends, Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Wensberg, of Seattle, came to Roseburg for the occasion.

Mrs. Ueland was born August 24, 1855, near Wesby, Vernon county, Wisconsin, and is of Norwegian descent. He was educated in the public schools and at Luther college at Decorah, Iowa. He was married in 1875 to Hannah Heibland and they made their home on a farm in Iowa for two years, before taking a homestead near Edgeley, North Dakota, where Mr. Ueland engaged in raising grain and cattle. He was very active in state politics for a number of years and was a member of the North Dakota state legislature for three sessions and was chairman of the state democratic convention one year.

Mr. Ueland retired from farming in 1910 and moved to Oregon, where he purchased a home in West Roseburg where he has since engaged in his hobby of plant breeding, cross fertilization and selection. Mr. Ueland purchased a Ford car in 1910, which he drove until 1938. The car proved to be a special attraction at many parades and celebrations held here, as it is one of the oldest models to have been kept in good running condition over such a long period of time in this community.

Mr. Ueland's wife passed away in September 1929. They were parents of four sons and seven daughters, fourteen grand children and thirteen great grandchildren. Children of Mr. Ueland still living include: Miss Alice Ueland, Miss Cora Ueland, of Los Angeles; Miss Emma Ueland, of Glendale, Calif.; Mrs. Edith Knollin, of Eugene; Mrs. Laura Berstler, of Norwalk, Calif.; Mrs. Anna Lutnes, of Westby, Montana; Mrs. Grace Holt, of Nequamee, Michigan and Andrew Ueland, of Arcadia, California. Two sons passed away a number of years ago and a third son, Arthur Ueland, of Plentywood, Montana, passed away last March.

Mr. Ueland has a host of friends in Roseburg, who wish him continued good health and many more happy birthdays.
