Although the Roseburg schools will open Monday, Sept. 10, the staff of instructors still is incomplete, City School Superintendent Paul S. Elliott reports. Teachers are needed in mathematics and science departments, and an instructor in physical education for girls is still to be employed.

"We are hoping to engage a woman now in the armed services," Supt. Elliott said. "We are in correspondence with several prospects, but date of discharge is very uncertain."

Total Disarmament of Japan Ordered by Mac

The first army will report to Eichelberger, the commander of the Japanese second army will report to Krueger, the Japanese commander in Korea will report to Lt. Gen. John Hodge, of the U. S. 24th Army corps. Arms must be turned over on orders of those three generals.

Japanese general headquarters must provide MacArthur immediately with designations and code names of all Japanese military and naval units, their strength, location and commanders.

Airfields, with runways improved, are to be turned over for occupational usage as quickly as required.

Office buildings, living quarters and communication facilities, storage facilities, transportation and communication facilities must be supplied on demand. Cable and radio facilities must be maintained.

Japanese work crews must be ready in quantity to repair roads, railroads and docks and construct occupational housing. Labor pools, both skilled and unskilled, must be available.

Sign posts in English letters at least six inches high must be posted at highway entrances of towns and cities.

Japan's naval commanders must put themselves at the disposal of Admirals Halsey of the Third fleet, Raymond A. Spruance of the Fifth fleet and Thomas C. Kinkaid of the Seventh fleet.

Weapons on all ships must be made inoperative. The Japanese vessels over 100 tons must be supervised by occupation authorities.

All seaports must be maintained. All minefields must be marked and removed.

Evidence Prepared
Information received from prisoners of war which may be used in war crime trials against Japanese will be delivered to General MacArthur's headquarters for courts-martial. Lt. Gen. Eichelberger said today.

"It is probable that many guilty persons may have killed themselves by this time," Eichelberger said.

An officer of the Australian air

force captured on Rabaul in January, 1942, prepared a dossier against certain Japanese officers at the Ashio camp, 90 miles from Yokohama.

Eichelberger said that Generals Waihiwright and Beebe also had considerable information against individual Japanese who might be tried for war crimes.

MacArthur Takes Action
General MacArthur, in a stern directive to the Japanese today gave them 48 hours in which to provide the names and locations of all allied prison camps as well as prisoner burial places.

Names, ranks, nationality, next of kin, home addresses, age, sex and physical condition must be listed. Prisoners are to receive the best medical care, adequate shelter, clothing and bathing facilities.

Prison camp commanders must relinquish their authority to the senior allied prisoner available. With the arrival of 850 allied prisoners here today, the total thus far freed was 2,368.

This number was expected to be boosted during the next two days with the arrival of 2,635 others.

Admiral Halsey announced 895 prisoners had been evacuated from the Hamamatsu area of Southern Honshu.

Into them.
Screaming victims who rushed from the shelters were bayoneted or machine-gunned. The guards threw dynamite charges into the tunnels to take care of the Americans left inside.

About 40 got out and hurled themselves over a 50-foot cliff on to a beach. Shore sentries and landing barge gunners shot some. The Japanese captured others and buried them alive.

One they captured after he had tried to swim out to sea. They prodded him with bayonets; poured gasoline on both his feet and set fire to them. They mocked, derided and bayoneted him until he collapsed. Then they poured gasoline over his body and watched flames devour it.

Slaughter at Sea
In a note dated March 10, Grew protested treatment of 150 American prisoners crowded into a Japanese freighter which was torpedoed and sunk off the Philippines on September 7, 1944.

The prisoners starved, thirsted and suffocated for nearly three weeks. When the ship was torpedoed, they were machine-gunned by Japanese guards as they floundered about in the sea.

Other guards threw hand grenades on the Americans trapped in the holds of the vessel. The Japanese recaptured 29 prisoners from the sea, took them to another ship in lifeboats, shot them, and threw their bodies back into the ocean.

There were less violent cases. Many messages protested lack of sanitation, food, medical supplies and clothing. One told how two Americans picked a papaya from a tree in their prison camp to relieve their hunger.

A Japanese mess sergeant

broke the left arm of each man with an iron bar as punishment. Another message said the United States had intercepted orders of Japanese military authorities ordering the outright murder of individuals surrendering or captured.

Overcrowding Faced by Schools, Elliott States

Roseburg schools will be laboring under a serious handicap resulting from overcrowding and lack of equipment, City School Superintendent Paul S. Elliott told members of the Roseburg Kiwanis club at the regular club luncheon program Tuesday. Discussing the program and problems of the Roseburg school district, Supt. Elliott said that rapid increase of population is imposing a heavy burden on limited facilities and that additional space and equipment will be required to make desired progress in the field of education.
