School Attendance Boost Indicated By Enrollment

Completion of two days' pre-
liminary registration for new
students in the community, plus
the spring registration, brings en-
rollment of the Senior High
school to 446 and the Junior High
school to 449. Paul S. Elliott,
school superintendent, reports.
There will be, of course, some
adjustments in these enrollments
because a few students have
moved out of the community and
have not notified the school au-
thorities. Supt. Elliott states. Last
year's enrollment in the Senior
High was 385 and the Junior
High 410 at their peak, registra-
tion indicating an increased en-
rollment of 10 per cent or more.
School begins in the two high
schools at 8:50 Monday morning
and at the elementary schools at
9 o'clock.

The cafeterias with hot lunch
programs will be in operation
Monday in Benson and Senior
High schools only. The cafeteria
in the Junior High school has
not been completed so the lunch
program will not be under way
there until a little later. Students
in the Junior High should
arrive to bring their lunches
for the first few days.

ANOTHER OPA MUDDLE

Action of the district OPA in "tying the can" to Les Ham-
mock, chairman of the Roseburg War Price and Rationing
board for two and one half years, is causing much local
speculation, particularly when district office representatives,
after patting OPA board members on the back for a fine
piece of work in handling the wartime rationing program,
followed with stinging criticism of price panel procedure.

In 25 years of newspaper work we have never attended
a meeting as freakish as the one conducted Thursday night
at the OPA office. The two representatives of the district
office with one breath criticized the Roseburg price panel
and with the next breath begged OPA board members to
volunteer for service as price panel members.

So crude was the approach that a neutral observer could
not avoid suspicion of a plot to disrupt the local set-up so
that reorganization will be virtually impossible, giving an
opening for the Portland office to take over price control
activities, thus eliminating all local management. After all,
with the OPA machine being stripped of its gears, the boys
in Portland must do something to hang onto their jobs as
long as possible.

Reading between the lines, one also would gather that
Portland is not at all satisfied with the leniency exhibited
by the Roseburg price panel toward alleged price violators.
It seems that the Portland office never overlooks a chance
to obtain a "contribution" if it can find some merchant who
through ignorance, carelessness or with intent, makes an
overcharge. OPA district office press releases boastfully
list "sentences" imposed on violators.

One of the lady members of the Roseburg price panel,
irked by criticism, declared her opinion that a price panel
should be composed of human beings who should act as
humans rather than as a machine and that merchants called
in for price violations should be treated as fellow humans.

She was informed, oh, so politely, that her idea was fine
in theory but not in practice; that any violation, no matter
how innocent, if allowed to go unpunished, was leading
directly to dire inflation.

After looking around Roseburg and observing the grocery
stores, restaurants and meat markets that have been closed
since the war, and talking to friends who have either quit
business, or are on the verge of doing so, to escape becoming
candidates for the booby hatch, we can commend the lady
on the price panel who has a spark of human sympathy for
those in trouble.

No rational person, we believe, can argue against the
necessity for strict price control. The great backlog of buy-
ing power in the form of savings accounts and war bonds is
a serious threat until commodities of all kinds again be-
come plentiful. No one can argue against the need for keep-
ing price chisellers under control but with the OPA holding
the dangerous authority of policeman, judge, jury and ex-
ecutioner, there is a definite need for some check upon
arbitrary exercise of such powers.

If, as the representatives of the Portland office intimated,
there has been discrimination between persons on the part
of the price panel of the Roseburg board, there is justifi-
cation for change. Naturally, the proceedings of the board
are not made public. On the other hand, they are kept
strictly confidential. Therefore, we can neither prove nor
disprove claims made by the officials from Portland.

But we do know that the Roseburg rationing board, under
the direction of Mr. Hammock, has been operating very
smoothly and orderly.

We know that great numbers of volunteer workers have
given of their time to assist in the program, going back
again and again to serve when needed. We do not believe
these people would have repeated their volunteer services
had they not found working conditions satisfactory. We
know that our editorial office, which, at one time, received
many complaints of rationing procedure, has been free of
such complaints for many months. We know that Mr. Ham-
mock has endeavored to do a fair and impartial job and
that he has had utmost confidence of his fellow board
members.

Admittedly speaking without knowing all of the "inside"
facts, we feel, from what we DO know of conditions on the
Roseburg board, that the action of the Portland district
office is indeed "peculiar" and must stem from some motive
other than appears upon the surface.
