

War Headquarters Are Abolished by Japanese

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Field Marshal Gen Sugiyama, however, killed himself with a pistol at his office near the palace, "as I was in an important post, I keenly feel my responsibility," he told his aide. Sugiyama, former war minister and one of Japan's three field marshals, had planned to lead the defense of the Tokyo area against the expected American invasion. More suicides were expected as the hunt for others named on MacArthur's list went forward. High on the list is Lt. Gen. Homma, of Bataan infamy, who had slipped away to his home on an island off western Japan. Seven others were named as leaders of the Black Dragon society, now ordered dissolved, but Japanese said two of the seven were dead and a third had no connection with the militaristic society. Cabinet in Self-Scrutiny Premier Higashi-Kuni today called a cabinet session after learning of MacArthur's 47-name list of "wanted" Japanese.

Sources close to the government said cabinet members probably would be asked if their own backgrounds could stand close allied inspection.

Japan's business leaders emphasized in an interview today that both the militarists and the industrialists knew before surrender that the war was lost—before the first atomic bomb dropped, but that militarists wouldn't admit it and "we industrialists were too cowardly to speak out." The nation, they said, was industrially paralyzed and on the verge of starvation.

Konoye Passes Buck
Prince Konoye, pre-war premier and present vice premier, told Associated Press Correspondent Russell Brines today that his resignation in October, 1941, resulted from arguments with Tojo over continuing peace negotiations.

Telling how he tried to arrange a conference with the late President Roosevelt, Konoye said: "I feel confident that if I had been able to see President Roosevelt, I could have established a basis for intervention of the imperial house (emperor) in the rising war tide within Japan."

But Tojo took over the government, and "I knew war was inevitable."
"The Japanese government long have had a reputation as liars," he told Brines, "because they were unable to control Japanese militarists in the field, or often didn't know what the militarists were doing."
Nimitz is Skeptical
Without having heard Konoye's tale about Japan's reputation for lacking veracity, Admiral Nimitz on Guam advised Americans that the Japanese were telling them what America wanted to hear and their stories should be taken with "a grain of salt."

Referring particularly to Japanese talk about airpower winning the war, he said: "I don't think our people should be thrown off base by accepting that. Air power was the spearhead and the sharp edge of the cutting knife—but the rest of the knife was there, too, and seapower brought it there."

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unemployed has been ditched. Mr. Truman was understood to have told the committee in a memo that the bigger weekly payments were "desirable" but not indispensable.

He said the "must" provisions were: Benefits lasting 26 weeks in all states; benefits for federal employees; and travel pay for stranded workers. All those provisions are still in the bill.

Airport Aid Funds Slated
The Senate today passed a bill to put up federal cash for a big program of airport building. The House has a different version before it, but hasn't acted on it yet.

The Senate-approved bill would grant \$375,000,000 a year, for five years—to be matched by states and cities. That would total \$1,875,000,000. The House version, okayed by the House Interstate Commerce committee, would grant \$650,000,000 over a ten-year period, not more than \$100,000,000 in any one year.

Agencies Control Voted
The House passed the Whittington bill which would bring federal corporations—like RFC and HOLC—under stricter congressional control. This action actually was a victory for the TVA and the Farm Credit agencies, for they are exempt from certain controls provided for in the bill.

They are not exempt under the Senate version, the Byrd-Butler bill, which has been gathering dust for months in the Senate Banking committee. It's up to that committee now to decide what to do about the House-approved measure.

It was learned that the Navy has renewed its pleas for continued secrecy for portions of the naval inquiry board's report on the 1941 Pearl Harbor disaster. These portions have to do with breaking the Japanese code.

But some members of the Senate Naval committee, which has the full naval report, say they believe the public ought to be given the whole story. A 10-man congressional committee will start an A-to-Z investigation of Pearl Harbor shortly.

Promotion to fireman 1-c was given Hallcraft September 1. A brother, Wilbur Hallcraft, F-2c, has just left for fleet replacement from Treasure Island, Mr. and Mrs. Hallcraft said.
