were closing because of labor disputes.
On Other Fronts
The situation in Detroit, where CIO Automobile Workers union officials are seeking an industry-wide 30 per cent wage boost, showed no major developments but General Motors corporation indicated 25,000 more workers might be laid off before week's end because of a shortage of parts.

New work stoppages during the last 24 hours idled 2,600 at the Nash-Kelvinator plant in Kenosha, Wis., in a strike the company termed "wildcat," while 3,500 shipbuilders in the New York metropolitan area struck over what CIO marine and shipbuilding workers spokesmen said was a dispute over holiday pay and seniority.

Elsewhere across the nation's troubled labor front, continuing strikes and walkouts kept thousands away from their jobs.

Bartle is expected to resume the office upon his return to civilian life.

War Labor Board Head Tenders Resignation

WASHINGTON, Sept. 20.—(AP)—Dr. George W. Taylor today offered his resignation as chairman of the War Labor board as Labor Secretary Schwellenbach sought to hold the board together by continuing it as a virtually independent agency.

Schwellenbach prepared a declaration of policy following a conference with the board enlivened by heated exchanges over WLB's future status under his direction.

Willis Arnold Released
Willis Arnold, 37, Roseburg, was released from custody today upon his own recognition following arrest on a charge of threatening to commit bodily harm. Arnold was reported by Deputy Sheriff Al Smith to have threat-

ened his former employer after being discharged. His release was ordered by Justice of the Peace Thomas Hartfield, conditional upon no further disturbance.

Point Plan Can Soon Be Dropped, Army Head Says

WASHINGTON, Sept. 20.—(AP)—General George C. Marshall

told Congress today that the point system of demobilization of soldiers can be abandoned by winter.

The Army chief of staff advised a joint Senate-House meeting that the present discharge score of 80 points could be lowered to 70 points by Oct. 1 and to 60 points by Nov. 1.

"We may reach a point in late winter when the point system will cease and all men with two years active service will be released," Marshall said.

He said there was no relationship between the rate of discharge of men from the Army

and War department plans for a postwar army.

Any such postwar plan, to told Congress, can wait until the middle of next year.
