Frenchmen these days.
These streets ought to be full of laughing, yelling children at play. They AREN'T. If there is a coming generation in France, it isn't visible to the eye of a stranger. You recall having read in the paper the other day that births in France are now materially exceeded by deaths.

OFF through France, headed northeast, over highways that would be almost deserted but for the heavy American military traffic.

In the fields the harvest is proceeding. The crops are chiefly grain, to make bread. In the fields of stubble, shot through even at this late season, with the blood-red poppies that are characteristic of this country, fall plowing is getting under way.

The methods in use seem astonishingly primitive to American eyes. From Paris to the Luxembourg border this writer saw only ONE tractor in use—and it was an ancient and wheezy affair. There are horses—sometimes two abreast, sometimes two hitched tandem, sometimes a team with a lead horse hitched tandem. Sometimes even three strung out in a row.

There are as many oxen as horses, pulling from traces tied around their horns. Very, very often there are cows—obviously cows that are worked in the fields by day and milked at night. Frequently there will be combinations of horses, cows and oxen hitched to the same plow. The plows are almost universally what we call the sidehill kind, with two mouldboards. They are turned over at the end of the row and go back again, instead of going around and around a "land" as is our practice.

The grain is cut usually with tiny binders, but you see scythes and even cradles at work. The edges are carefully cut out with scythes, and after it is all finished and the grain hauled in to be threshed, the fields are gleaned by women, wearing aprons with huge pockets in front in which the gleaned heads are placed as picked up. Not a straw is permitted to be wasted.

THE trees are gleaned as carefully as the fields. Every twig is picked up. You see these fagots being hauled home along all the roads of France—which are invariably tree-bordered—in bundles on backs, in two-wheeled carts pulled by women and children, occasionally in horse-drawn carts, and very often in wheelbarrows. The wheelbarrow is an indispensable item in the transport of present post-war France.

And ANY kind of fuel is precious in a coal-short France that expects to go exceedingly cold this winter after the war—maybe even colder than it was during the war.

THE whole rural picture of Northwestern France is certainly in sharp contrast with the United States, and in almost equally sharp contrast with present-day agricultural England, with its swiftly growing mechanization of all farming. In England the number of tractors has doubled since the beginning of the war—and according to the figures it was considerable even then.

This writer would say offhand that the use of tractors is relatively greater in England than in America. It is practically nil in France.

THE village system of agriculture is universal here. The

LABOR AND PUBLIC OPINION

The storm of labor agitation sweeping the country is arousing considerable alarm. The general public, usually tolerant in labor matters, is not apt to be patient with disputes contributing to shortages from which early relief had been anticipated. A public, recently released from gasoline rationing, is not apt to view with complacency a return to rationing because of labor disagreements. People who are without means of transportation because the family jalopy gave up the ghost during war days, or those who are daily expecting the clattering old bus to collapse like the one-horse chaise, are not apt to view with equanimity delays in production of automobiles because of labor disputes.

A nation needing millions of new homes and business houses is apt to become aroused because materials with which to build are being withheld from the market due to unsettled wage demands. Dissatisfaction will gain impetus when fuel supplies become exhausted and people are made uncomfortable by lack of warmth in homes, offices and places of business.

The general public does not often stop to analyze reasons behind strikes, nor whether demands for higher pay are justified.

The nation has had four years of war, during which people have been deprived of many things. They have accepted food shortages, rationing, scarcity of clothing, lack of adequate housing, congested transportation, old automobiles, and other inconveniences because of the war effort. The average person has been eagerly anticipating the day he could again sip a liberal slice of butter on his hotcakes, smell the delicious aroma of a thick ham steak, drive in the country without fear of automobile or tires collapsing, buy a new refrigerator or washing machine, build a new house or do, or have, one or more of the hundreds of things he has dreamed about during war years.

Mr. Average Citizen is apt to become quite impatient if he believes he is being unreasonably deprived of those things for which he has been planning and saving. It is not probable that he will seek to uncover the underlying causes for disputes occasioning delays.

The public, which has been educated to fear inflation as it would fear the plague, is fearful, too, that accumulative wage increases will loose a spiral of inflation. It has been common experience in this country that every advance in wages results in an increase in prices.

A new experiment is in progress today. It is based on a theory that wages can be raised and prices held down. This is called "cost absorption" by the OPA. It is, in other words, profit control. The plan is to reduce profit margins on individual items, on the theory that profit levels may be maintained by more rapid turnover. This is the chain-store theory, which federal economists propose for the country as a whole. Mr. Average Citizen is very apt to be skeptical. He will more readily accept the theory that any boost in wages means an increase in commodity prices, which, in turn, means more wages, thus promoting the inflationary spiral. His fears are not being calmed by the outbreak of strikes.

Labor contends, of course, that wages have not kept pace with living costs, that government price indexes are inaccurate, that maintenance of high wage scales is essential to continued prosperity. But Mr. Citizen probably will not be inclined to deliberate on problems of economics while shivering in his unheated living room.

Labor has many problems during the readjustment period. These problems will demand a vast amount of study, planning and negotiation. But labor stands to gain or lose public support and approbation. The strike is labor's most effective weapon. It should be used only in extreme emergency and after all other means of settlement have failed. If the public, as a whole, once becomes convinced reconversion and readjustment are being delayed by hasty or unnecessary strikes, the labor cause will be set back many years.

That brings up another interesting fact. Near Paris, there are practically NO cows. The number increases steadily as you get nearer to the German border.

From Paris to the Luxembourg border this writer saw not one single hog—confirming the bitter statement of Frenchmen that the Germans swept France clean of every pig.

Beavers Defeat Rainiers 3d in Succession, 11-0

Portland's champion Beavers routed the Pacific Coast League playoff today with three straight wins over the Seattle Rainiers, needing only one more victory to enter the Governors' cup finals.

The Beavers blanked their northwest rivals 11-0 last night behind the two-hit hurling of Halset. The two teams will resume their series in a double-header in Seattle Sunday afternoon.

In the last starting lower bracket semi-finals the San Francisco Seals took a 2-0 edge by shading the Solons 3-1 at Sacramento. They will play again tonight.

Helser not only held Seattle to two weak singles, both in the eighth inning, but paced Portland at the plate with two doubles and a single. He batted in four runs and scored one.

San Francisco won its second in a row from Sacramento behind the effective pitching of Frank Seward, who allowed only two runs in the seventh inning. The Seals stepped off a one-run lead in the fourth when Gus Suhr scored on Roy Nicely's single. They added two more in the seventh with Seward virtually sealing up his own game with a double that brought in the first run.

Johnny Pintar was the Sacramento pitching victim. Seward gave up 10 hits to Pintar's 11. Both hurlers went the route.

U. S. Officer Killed at Saigon, Second Wounded

Lt. Col. A. Peter Dewey of Washington, D. C., was killed and Capt. Joseph Coolidge of New Hampshire was wounded seriously in fighting Wednesday at Saigon, where native Annamites violently protested French rule of their homeland.

In defending U. S. headquarters against the natives for three hours, American officers killed at least eight natives.

British, French and Japanese also suffered casualties in the uprising. In its fourth day today, as a result of the continued disorders, Marshal Terauchi, the Japanese commander, was placed under virtual house arrest.

In Washington, Col. Dewey's father, former Rep. Charles Dewey of Illinois, said that his son had served with both the Polish and American armies in World War two and had won a decoration for organizing French Maquis in southern France.

Pvt. Wallace M. Brisbin Ends Service, Returns

Pvt. Wallace M. Brisbin, Roseburg, who served 37 months overseas with the Army engineers, terminating his service in Belgium, has been returned to a report from Miami Army air field. The plane in which Brisbin made the return trip was forced to skirt the hurricane which recently struck the Florida coast.

First Lieutenant Fred H. Engle, Melrose Star Rt., Roseburg, and Ssgt. Herbert C. Trozell, Glendale, were among Douglas county men who arrived Sept. 22 at Newport News on the return trip from Europe, according to an Associated Press report.

Medal Is Awarded to Capt. W. M. Campbell, Jr.

WITH THE 78TH LIGHTNING DIVISION IN GERMANY—The Bronze Star Medal for "meritorious service" has been awarded to Capt. William M. Campbell, Jr., whose wife, Mrs. Mary J. Campbell, resides at 435 South Main street, Roseburg, Oregon. Captain Campbell is a son of Mr. and Mrs. W. M. Campbell, Roseburg.

"Captain Campbell, as deputy to the division finance officer, has by his close cooperation with unit personnel officers, enabled the finance officer to effect prompt payment of troops at all times. He worked long and arduous hours handling the exchange of currency for personnel going to and returning from pass. The thorough and conscientious manner in which he performed his duties contributed to the high morale of the troops and is in accordance with the highest military traditions."
