DDT Effective On Vetch Weevil

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Corvallis, Sept. 27.—The hairy vetch weevil, or bruchid as it is more properly called, can be controlled satisfactorily by the use of 3 per cent DDT dust at the rate of 25 pounds per acre, according to a joint announcement just made by the Federal Bureau of Entomology and plant quarantine and the agricultural experiment station here.

The first preliminary announcement was made in the form of a letter from Robert Reider, extension entomologist, to all western Oregon county agents notifying them in advance of the fall planting dates that satisfactory control has been achieved. Reider reports that the application, to be effective, must be made just as the first pods appear. Thorough application under favorable conditions and at the correct time are essential to control. A more detailed report on control procedure is promised. The hairy vetch weevil, which had not previously yielded to existing insecticides, had in a few years wiped out hairy vetch seed crops in the northern Willamette valley and had spread to practically all producing areas this year.

Slaughter Quota's End Affects Beef Payments

Beef production payments to Douglas County producers will not be affected by the recent removal of slaughter quotas on slaughterers, according to Leo Sparks chairman of the county AAA committee. Payments will continue to be made on a sliding scale, the same as since the program began last May.

The only change, Mr. Sparks explained, is the program now includes all slaughterers. Before it was necessary for the cattle to be sold to a "legally authorized slaughterer."

Under the new plan, there may be cases where it is difficult to verify the name of the slaughterer. In those instances it may be necessary for the county committee to require evidence that no duplicate payment will be made on the cattle.

It still is necessary for producers and feeders to present evidence that the cattle are eligible for the payment. The requirements are that the cattle were owned and fed for not less than 30 days before they were sold for slaughter, that they weighed at least 800 pounds and brought at least \$1.95 a hundred, and that they were delivered to a slaughterer for slaughter within 29 days of the date of sale.

Muscle Expert's Wife Describes Strenuous Life

MIAMI, Fla., Oct. 1.—(AP)—Mrs. Mary MacFadden, estranged wife of physical culturist Einar Weir, testified here that her husband once insisted that he do 200 deep knee bends or forfeit his love.

"I went through the strenuous exercise as required although I suffered at the time from a muscular rupture, the after effect of childbirth," the motherly, English-born one-time beauty contest winner told John C. Gramling, master in chancery who is hearing the 77-year-old MacFadden's divorce action.

Describing MacFadden as "eccentric" on the subject of exercise and fresh air, she declared he several times endangered their children's health by his demands. He required them to exercise when ill, she said.

Mrs. MacFadden testified that her husband's fortune of several million dollars, "which I no longer enjoy" began to build up from an idea she advanced—publication of True Story magazine.

A 1914 photograph of the physical culturist standing on his head was introduced as evidence.

"This was made when we first met," she stated. "He probably would still be standing on his head except for me. I put him on his feet."

Mrs. Brauna St. Phillip, daughter of the couple, testified she saw her father come downstairs in 1931 at their Englewood, N. J., home wiping blood from his mouth after a row with her mother.
