Enlisted male personnel, 44 points

Male officer personnel, 49 points

WAVE officer personnel, 35 points

Enlisted WAVE personnel, 29 points

About 327,000 men and women are expected to be released under the U. S. Navy's new point discharge system. One-half point is allowed for each year of age, one-half point for each month of active duty since Sept. 1, 1939, and 10 extra points for all dependents, regardless of number. Total points needed for release are shown above. Preference will be given those longest at sea or overseas. Demobilization of Coast Guardsmen will be on same basis. Anyone holding one of the following Navy decorations, or Army equivalent, is entitled to release upon request: Medal of Honor, Navy Cross, Legion of Merit, Silver Star, Distinguished Flying Cross.

Prevention of Postwar Turmoil Calls for Speed

You'd think that the Big Five council of foreign ministers in London would have been able to reach some sort of workable accord, what with the Second World War still casting its monstrous shadow over us, and the entire eastern hemisphere, from Europe clear through Asia facing a desperate period of hunger and politico-economic chaos.

Time is precious in these perilous days. It would be absurd, of course, to suppose that peace treaties and other far-reaching agreements can be reached in a few hours but it's a terrible mistake to underestimate the dangers of slowness in getting the war-torn countries as well as allied-back on their feet as fast as possible. Before the coming winter is through we are going to see situations in the late war theaters where delay of even a week in distribution of food will cost many lives from starvation. Maybe that delay can be charged to tardiness in implementing peace and getting rehabilitation under way now.

This isn't to say that the present foreign ministers' conference has been directly concerned with such problems as the feeding of Europe. The main item on its agenda has been the framing of peace treaties for Bulgaria, Hungary, Romania and Finland. Still, this task has a very direct relation to the rehabilitation question. Failure to complete it retards rehabilitation.

We mustn't forget that upon the next few months may depend the future of peace.

So it's good to hear talk of another meeting of the Big Three heads of state to take up the situations which are plaguing re-

Air Power Key to U. S. Security, Says Harvey Stowers

For the first time in history a powerful nation, Japan, has been brought to its knees by air power and without invasion by land forces, Harvey Stowers, assistant to the president of Aircraft Industries of America, told members of the Roseburg Kiwanis club at the Umpqua hotel today.

Speaking on the subject, "The Future of Aviation in America," Mr. Stowers, former Lockheed Aircraft corporation executive and management consultant for leading automobile and aircraft manufacturers, declared that America's precision bombing technique, climaxed by the use of only two atomic bombs, not only paralyzed Japan's war making powers, but demonstrated once and for all that aggressive wars are no longer profitable.

Emphasizing the value of technological research, Stowers pointed out that development of the atomic bomb cost America two billion dollars and required two and one-half years of research, but paid off in dramatic fashion and saved countless thousands of American lives. He added that even if America were to continue to spend two billion dollars a year for comparable scientific research and development of new weapons, it would be the cheapest life insurance this nation could buy.

"We spent three hundred billion dollars on the war," Stowers pointed out. "If by spending two billions a year on research, we could buy 150 years of peace, it would be the cheapest investment we ever made."

War Barrier Neglected
Stowers declared that if America had maintained its air strength through the World War I, World War II need not have occurred. He then said: "If, ever again, we allow our country to be surpassed in scientific and technological leadership by other nations, and if these tools of destruction should fall into the hands of some gangster nation or some future Hitler who decides that he wants to dominate the world, civilization as we know it can be wiped out in 24 hours."

In dealing with the peacetime prospects of aviation, Stowers admitted that America's aircraft industry, which zoomed up from 1st place to first place among the nation's industries in five war-time years, or 13,500 per cent, faces serious reconversion problems. He predicted, however, that the industry will ultimately overcome them and will become one of America's greatest peacetime industries.

Stowers predicted that approximately 60 per cent of the nation's aircraft, particularly its great new transports, will be built on the Pacific Coast, which accounted for approximately 40 per cent of America's warplanes.

8 Million Jobless In '46 Forecast by Reconversion Head

WASHINGTON, Oct. 2. — (U.P.) Reconversion Director John W. Snyder said today there may be 8,000,000 unemployed by next spring with "high unemployment" persisting through 1946.

He made this prediction in a report to the President and congress. He labeled it "three keys to reconversion—production, jobs, markets."

Snyder's forecast was based on the contention that job-giving will be unable to keep pace with a prospective million-a-month demobilization.

But he was "firmly optimistic" about the future, provided the nation works as a team. He asserted:

1. Prompt, peaceful settlement of labor-management differences is a reconversion "must."
2. Congress should act promptly on those four points in the President's program calling for "full employment, transitional tax adjustments, broadening and raising unemployment compensation, and raising minimum wages."

(Three tax steps recommended were: Repeal of the 3 per cent normal tax on individuals, repeal of the excess profits tax, effective January 1 next, and setting a definite date for reducing excises.)
3. Cooperation and teamwork among "management and labor, business and farmer, federal, state and local governments" is indispensable, if there is to be a rapid expansion of peacetime production, jobs for all those willing and able to work, and stable markets for business and agriculture.
