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# Cannibalism At Belsen Camp Told

LUENEBURG, Germany, Oct. 1

(AP)—A German doctor testified before a British military court that cannibalism was rampant in the men's compound of Belsen concentration camp.

"I have seen bodies with the livers removed for food," Dr. Fritz Leo told the court. "I have seen many bodies with the ears cut off, parts of cheeks, shoulders, arms, back and even parts of sexual organs cut off for food—either eaten raw or cooked later."

Forty-five SS defendants, their eyes dropping to the floor, heard the doctor say the SS gave orders that any prisoner guilty of cannibalism would be hanged or beaten to death.

Lydia Somszajn, a Polish Jewess who was an inmate, said six Polish girls once plotted to blow up the gas chamber but four were found out and hanged.

"The Germans couldn't find the fifth girl and I was the sixth," she said.

Dr. Leo, who cared for the inmates from February until April, testified he had three or four patients a week who had suffered bullet wounds.

"Only the smaller wounds could be treated," he said, his voice quivering. "We didn't have facilities to care for major wounds. If we had patients with appendicitis we had to watch them die."

"The whole camp became a latrine."

Fat Stock Sale Yields 4-H Members Tidy Sum

Douglas County 4-H boys and girls received a total of \$1,127.29 from their first fat stock sale held Saturday, September 29, reports Kenneth C. Munnick, county club agent. Twenty-five cents per pound was paid for the top steer owned by Bill Weir netting the owner \$270.

Four steers totaling slightly over two tons in weight averaged 21.3 cents per pound. Ten lambs sold for an average of 17c per pound and the hogs sold for an average of 20c per pound. This was the first Douglas County 4-H fat stock sale and is to be planned as an annual 4-H event.

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Beef Payment Date Extended

The closing date for beef production payments has been extended for one month. Producers and feeders now have until October 31 to make application at county AAA offices for payments on sales made since the start of the program through August 31. On sales since September 1, applications for the 50 cents a hundred payment will have to be filed within 60 days.
