

## Mrs. Dora Mallory, Former Resident Of Oakland, Passes

Word has been received of the death of Mrs. Dora Mallory at Salem Tuesday, October 2. A resident of Douglas county for many years, Mrs. Mallory had made her home in Salem the past year. She was 87 years old and had been in failing health for some time.

Born in Janesville, Wisconsin, September 14, 1858, Dora Ella Pratt was of a family of pioneers. When she was nine, they moved to Southern Minnesota and settled at Albert Lea just at the time of the famous Sioux Indian uprising in 1867. She was married March 13, 1876, to Samuel S. Mallory and they had five children, only one of whom survives.

After the death of her husband in 1912, Mrs. Mallory homesteaded in Montana and then returned to Minnesota for a few years. She came to Oregon in 1921 and lived in Oakland with her son and daughter-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. A. L. Mallory, publishers of the Oakland Tribune. After 1922 she spent a couple of years at the home of her granddaughter, Mrs. H. D. Hanon, at Junction City and Klamath Falls and then went to Salem to be with her son's family again.

In addition to her son, A. L. Mallory, eight grandchildren survive: Stanley Mallory, Eugene; Philip Mallory, in service with the Marines overseas; James Mallory, just discharged from naval service at San Diego, Calif.; Doral Hanon, Klamath Falls; Helen Mallory, student nurse, Portland; and Arthur Platt, Robert Platt and Mrs. Lulu Fowler of Chicago.

## National Forest Timber For Sale

Sealed bids will be received by the Forest Supervisor, Roseburg, Oregon, up to and ending October 13, 1945, for all the live and dead timber designated for cutting located on an area embracing about 60 acres within the NW 1/4, Section 18, T. 26 S., R. 1 W., W. M., North Umpqua River watershed, Umpqua National Forest, estimated to be 500 M. feet B. M., more or less, of Douglas fir, and an unestimated amount of white fir, western hemlock, western red cedar and California incense cedar. No bid of less than \$3.50 per M. foot for Douglas fir and \$1.25 per M. foot for white fir, western hemlock, western red cedar and California incense cedar will be considered. In determining the high bid, the rate for Douglas fir only will be considered. In addition to the prices paid for stumpage, a co-operative deposit of \$0.25 per M. foot B. M. to cover the cost of tree planting, seed sowing and timber stand improvement work on the area cut over for the total cut of timber under the terms of the agreement, will be required. \$1,000.00 must accompany each bid, to be applied on the purchase price, refunded, or retained in part as liquidated damages, according to conditions of sale. The right to reject any and all bids is reserved. Before bids are submitted, full information concerning the timber, the conditions of sale, and the submission of bids should be obtained from the Forest Supervisor, Roseburg, Oregon. Before final award, the high bidder will be required to make a satisfactory showing of financial ability to carry out the agreement. Bids with rates in excess of those permissible under MPR 460 will be reduced to the allowable maximum in making the award.

## Beef Payment Procedure Has No Complications

Farmers are finding a little change in the procedure for applying for and receiving beef production payments through their county AAA offices as the result of the removal of slaughter quotas on packers. Payments are being made on eligible cattle sold to any slaughterer. County offices require certification of sale by the buyer and evidence of past ownership to prevent duplicate payments on the same cattle. The rate of payment is 50 cents per hundred pounds for sales of "good" cattle weighing 800 pounds or more. Forty million dollars has been set aside for the program, which will continue through next June 30. The subsidy is designed to encourage feeding of cattle to heavier weights.
