Coal Strike Now Chief Worry of Government

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oil early next week. He said the union, which struck for a 50 per cent wage rate increase, was "not capitulating to the oil companies," but remained on strike against them. The union had accepted the government's proposal of a temporary 15 per cent wage increase and appointment of an arbitrator to settle the dispute, but the operators rejected the offer.

The optimistic reports involved workers in the automotive industry in Detroit and longshoremen in New York. The Ford Motor Co. said auto, truck and tractor production, idle since Sept. 14 after the layoff of nearly 50,000 employees, would be resumed next week following an expected end of the six-week-old strike of 4,500 Kelsey-Hayes Wheel Co. workers.

The CIO United Automobile Workers said the strike would end Monday after unsuccessful efforts of the strikers to have four discharged workers reinstated. The walkout caused the Ford plants to close because of lack of parts.

Leslie Downie, Kelsey-Hayes treasurer, however, disagreed with the CIO announcement that the strike was over. "It won't be over until enough men report to start production," Downie declared.

At the same time, in Detroit, the UAW said a notice of intention to strike by some 145,000 Ford company workers would be filed Monday with the National Labor Relations board in Washington. The primary issue, union officials said, would be the 30 per cent wage increase demand, which is being sought for the automotive industry.

Henry Mayer, counsel for the Independent Federation of Long Line Telephone Workers, said at New York 200,000 union members would take a strike vote within 15 days, probably demanding an average wage boost of 30 per cent. The union estimated 200,000 left their jobs yesterday in the four-hour cessation of work.

Pickets Get Injunction
At Hollywood, 300 studio union pickets, armed with a Superior court injunction to prevent the Warner Brothers studio from using tear gas or live hose, appeared this morning at the main gate.

In an outbreak of violence yesterday in the eight-month-old AFL union jurisdictional dispute, more than two score men and women were injured and three autos overturned. Nine strike leaders were freed on \$500 bail each. The strike involving 7,000 persons stemmed from a jurisdictional dispute between two AFL unions over affiliation of some 77 set decorators.

Laval Expelled Second Time From Courtroom
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beaux said: "Laval is right." Minor Charge Fended Off.
Laval, successful yesterday in contesting accusations that he plotted against France's domestic security, still faced the more serious charge of having had intelligence with the enemy during the 1940 meeting of Marshal Petain and Adolf Hitler at Monro.

Laval was expelled Thursday from the French high court of justice on the first day of his trial but was readmitted to the courtroom yesterday and made a lengthy plea in his own behalf.

The expulsion order today came after a heated argument between Laval, Prosecutor Mornet and Mongibeaux.

Mongibeaux attempted to obtain from Laval an answer as to who brought him back to power in the Vichy regime in 1942 after Petain had ordered him arrested. Laval refused to answer the question.

Patton Unaware Kin POW at Time Of Mystery Blow

BAD TOELZ, Germany, Oct. 5.—(AP)—Gen. George S. Patton, Jr., said today concern for all Americans held at Hammelburg prompted his abortive strike at the German camp last March 27 and he did not know until nine days later that his son-in-law was among the prisoners there.

The son-in-law is Lt. Col. John K. Waters, Maryland-born West Pointer, who was captured in North Africa early in 1943. He was among Americans and Allied prisoners freed April 7, not by Patton's forces but by a column of the U. S. Seventh army's 14th armored division.

Patton, who is being transferred Sunday from command of his veteran 13th army to the skeletonized 15th army, lost a task force of about 300 men in the March 27 rescue attempt by his Fourth armored division. The defeat of the task force was related by AP Correspondent Edward D. Ball in an April 13 dispatch from the Third army front.

Ball, now in Berlin, said today there were no indications at the time Patton sent out his task force that he knew his son-in-law was in the camp, since the last word from Waters had been that he was in a camp in Poland with Amos Carter, Jr.

Austin Lake, war correspondent-columist of the Boston American, said in an article yesterday that the thrust by the Third armored task force was "an incomprehensible mystery mission" until "we later discovered this stalag held Gen. Patton's son-in-law."

Lake said the camp was some 50 miles outside the Third army's combat zone and that it would have been overrun by the Seventh army anyway in a matter of days.

Commenting upon this article, Patton displayed his personal and official diaries to show he did not know Waters was held at Hammelburg. He said the liberation of the camp was attempted because of fear that American prisoners "might be murdered" by the retreating Germans.

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after cabinet appointments are completed. Formerly Japan's ambassador to the United States, the new premier said he thought it would be possible for Japan and the United States to become friends.

He said he expected no difficulty in finding liberal, progressive men for his new government. "These are the men of Japan," he declared, "and it is to them that I am looking in making appointments."

Asked if his cabinet would be a stop-gap to last only until the January elections, Shidehara said he hoped the body once formed would "continue as long as it has the confidence of the people."

Foe of Militarists
Japanese sources said Lt. Gen. Richard K. Sutherland, MacArthur's chief of staff, had told Nippon's foreign ministry in a conference that the Americans had no objection to Shidehara's appointment.

This marks the first time in history that any foreign approval has been solicited prior to the selection of Japanese government. Shidehara, one of Japan's best known liberals, waged a strong fight against imperialistic militarists in the late '20s and early '30s during a series of crises over the Japanese expansion to the Asiatic continent.

He was councillor at the Japanese embassy in Washington before the First World War and served as Japan's ambassador there from 1919 to 1922.

The plants were the St Paul and Tacoma lumber plant and the White River Lumber Company at Enumclaw. AFL officials declared they would fight the orders in court Oct. 15 and 19.

The St. Paul and Tacoma company announced later today that the mill and woods operations will resume work Monday, about 750 employees are involved.

The strike had begun to interfere with water shipment of lumber. AFL seamen in Everett, Wash., refused to load what they called "hot" lumber, and two ships steamed away half-loaded. Lumber vessels in the Columbia river also were affected.

The AFL lumber strike policy committee said today the Sailors union of the Pacific head declared, in a telephone conversation from San Francisco, that no seamen "are going to sail any ships into any dock to pick up any lumber."

In a statement attacking the CIO and lumber operators, AFL strike officials asserted that present negotiations between the two might end in slight wage increases, "an effort . . . to set a precedent and break our strike."

Navy Bus and Army Truck Collide, Killing 5 Persons

SANTA ROSA, Calif., Oct. 6.—(AP)—A head-on crash that left a Navy bus and Army truck tangled mass of wreckage killed five persons and injured 28, four of them critically, two miles south of Petaluma, Calif., last night.

The packed bus, headed north on the two-lane Redwood highway, was carrying workers home from the Mare Island Navy yard at Vallejo.

Coroner Silvershield of Sonoma county said the army truck had just pulled onto the highway from a side road when the two vehicles plowed together. The three soldier occupants of the truck and two of the bus passengers were killed by the impact.

War Vets' Needs to Cost Government Billions

WASHINGTON, Oct. 6.—(AP)—Looking after war veterans' needs will cost at least \$2,607,119,250 this year.

That's almost four times as much as it cost to run the entire federal government in 1916.

Each year the cost will go up. New benefits will be added, more veterans will be entitled to pensions.

How high is it likely to go? The Brookings institute is one of the few organizations to attempt a partial answer. It doesn't hint at what the maximum may eventually be.

But its economists, in trying to estimate postwar taxes, guessed that by the fiscal year 1947-48 veterans' benefits will cost \$2,889,000,000.

Pensioners, 78 and 76, On Their Honeymoon

VANCOUVER, B. C., Oct. 6.—(AP)—Seventy-eight-year-old Robert Knox and 76-year-old Mrs. Emilino Dougherty were on their honeymoon today, culmination of a romance that budded at an old age pensioners' meeting.

They were married last night at St. Andrew's Wesley United Church. They had been going to meetings for years but it wasn't until a little while ago, Mr. Knox said, that "I figured out there wasn't much sense in the two of us living alone."

5 Nazi POWs Hanged for Murdering 6th Prisoner

LONDON, Oct. 6.—(AP)—Five German prisoners of war were hanged for the murder of a fellow prisoner whom they had "tried" and condemned for deserting the Nazi creed.

The men were accused of having tried in a "Kangaroo court" Sgt. Major Wolfgang Rosterg, whom they hanged in a Scottish prison camp latrine two days before Christmas last year, a day after his arrival at the camp.

Hundreds Stranded by Strike of Bus Drivers

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 6.—(AP)—Pacific Greyhound officials said between 500 and 700 passengers, mostly women and children, still were stranded today in isolated communities in Arizona, New Mexico, Nevada and Northern California where they were left at midnight Thursday when the bus drivers went out on strike. They are being moved to the nearest railroad line in private cars.

There has been "some trouble" with returned soldiers in New Mexico and Nevada who have started to raise hell because they were dumped, Ackerman said. "We are vetting them any form of transportation we can," he added.
