Mrs. Harriett Moore, 92, a resident of the lower Calapooia district, near Oakland, died Sunday at the home of a daughter in Salem, where she has been residing since she became ill last February.

Born January 3, 1853, at Wheeling, Ohio, (later Wheeling, W. Va.), she came to the Pacific coast with her parents and when only six weeks of age, crossing the plains by ox team. The family settled in the Willamette valley at Fairfield, about 20 miles north of Salem.

While visiting near Kerby, Oregon, with a sister, she met Shelton D. Moore, to whom she was later married, residing at Kerby for approximately 20 years. Mr. Moore died in 1935.

She was the mother of 11 children, of whom eight survive. They are Ralph W. Moore, Melrose, Mrs. Nellie Lov, Gerber, Calif.; Mrs. Lulu Brook, Salem; Mrs. Myrtle Ballew, Seattle; Mrs. Hazel Beck, Corvallis; Mrs. Maple Steele, Portland; Archie Moore, Oakland, and Halbert Moore, San Diego. She also leaves a brother, T. A. Dittmars, Gervais, Ore.; a sister, Mrs. Nora Byrd, Salem; eleven grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.

Funeral services will be held at the Rigdon mortuary, Salem, at 3 P. M. Wednesday, with interment in Fairfield cemetery.
