CONCERT ASSOCIATION MEMBERS URGED TO RENEW MEMBERSHIPS

All members of the Roseburg Community Concert association are being urged to renew their subscriptions as members of the association within the next six weeks, as the membership drive will be opened to the general public Monday, October 22.

Members are always given an opportunity for renewing their memberships in that only the number of memberships will be taken as the auditorium will seat.

The association has enjoyed two very fine years and a large number of the guest artists appearing in concert here, having gained new heights and been highly rated in the musical world during the last two years.

Dorothy Maynor, negro soprano, was the first guest artist to be presented by the Roseburg association and although Miss Maynor has only been competing in the music field the last six years, she has been recognized by leading critics as having one of the greatest soprano voices of all times. Press releases on Miss Maynor this last season rate her as one of the best performers in the musical field. Todd Duncan, negro singer, and his accompanist, William Allen, a Portland, Ore. boy, were heard here the first year of the association and they have just returned from a very successful tour of the South American countries. Alexander Kipnis, heard here last spring, has just completed his new album of Boris Godunoff recordings and his recordings of Russian folk songs are considered "tops" by musical lovers. Rose Hampton, famous soprano, was heard here in concert last year also and has been highly publicized as one of the leading singers of the time.

Only through the music lovers of Douglas county forming the Concert association, has it been possible for these great artists to be heard in person in Roseburg. As no tickets are ever sold for any one concert, only members are privileged to attend. The membership drive is open to the general public one week every fall. This year's drive will open October 22 and will definitely close Saturday, October 27. No more memberships will be taken after that date until the fall of 1946. Its future progress will rest upon the degree to which we Americans continue to have the opportunity for profitable, productive employment."

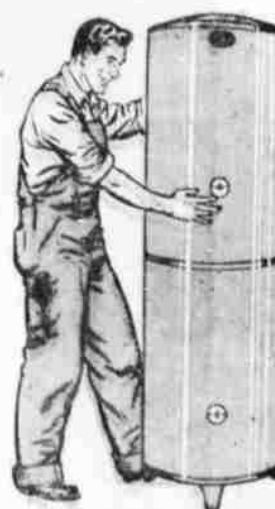
POTATO WORKERS NEEDED IN KLAMATH COUNTY

Potato digging has started in earnest in the Klamath Basin and will continue at this rate for thirty days. Pickers are badly needed. Picking rate is 5c per 60 pounds, with special upward adjustments in poor fields. Other labor is \$1.25 per hour. Camping equipment with bedding and tents is usually needed. Workers should register at the Farm Labor Office, 116 South 6th Street, Klamath Falls.

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
