Pine Box company. Permanent injunction asked. Meanwhile, in several Washington cities CIO attorneys went to court asking permanent injunctions against AFL pickets which temporarily disrupted work at CIO plants last week. The first hearing was held this morning at Kelso, Wash., and a

second involving Grays Harbor operations in the Aberdeen area was set for tomorrow. The St. Paul and Tacoma Lumber company mill at Tacoma returned to normal operations today after being down 11 days because the company's CIO employees declined to go through AFL union picket lines. The picket lines were withdrawn Friday night in compliance with a temporary injunction obtained by the CIO International Wood Workers of America. The company's camps also

opened today as did also the White River Lumber company operations at Enumclaw from which pickets likewise were removed by temporary court order. CIO Settlement Near. Meanwhile negotiations by the CIO International Woodworkers of America for a 25-cent hourly wage increase continues Thursday when meetings with operators and the U. S. Conciliation service reconvene. The 40,000 CIO workers approved a strike vote Sept. 19 to support wage demands but union officials have not called the men off the jobs. At both CIO and operators of CIO-managed mills have indicated prospects of settlement. At Eugene, Ore., the CIO Oregon State Industrial Union council held its convention yesterday and approved a resolution condemning AFL picketing of CIO lumber mills.

Rainiers Hold 2-1 Edge Over Seals in Playoff

SEATTLE, Oct. 8.—(AP)—The Seattle Rainiers, holding a 2-1 edge over the San Francisco Seals in the finals of the Pacific Coast league Governor's cup playoffs, will invade the Bay City this week for concluding games of the seven-game series. Play will be resumed there Wednesday night. The two teams broke even over the weekend as the Rainiers won 7-5 Sunday and the Seals took Saturday night's contest 4-2 behind the five-hit hurling of their ace righthander, Joyce. Seattle won the series opener Friday night. Hal Turpin, who opposed Joyce, was nipped for 12 hits but gave up only one earned run.

truck drivers and helpers in the New York metropolitan area reported for work despite their plans for a strike early today. Mr. Truman said a stoppage "might deprive a large section of the country of essential transportation" and asked the men to work pending an investigation of their dispute with the Railway Express agency. Thousands Back on Jobs. In Detroit, back-to-work movements affecting more than 65,000 workers started in the Ford and Hudson Motor company and the Kelsey-Hayes wheel company

plants. The situation there was the brightest in weeks during which about 80,000 persons were off the job in the automobile industry because of labor controversies. Across the international boundary from Detroit, however, the strike of approximately 10,000 Ford employees in Windsor, Ont., became more serious when factory power plants were shut down. The Canadian strike centers on contract demands. Other minor disputes kept about 3,750 on the sidelines in the Detroit metropolitan area. Returns to work over the nation included the 43,000 oil workers in 51 refineries and plants in 15 states which were seized by the government after collapse of negotiations on a CIO union's demand for a 30 per cent wage rate increase. Also on the bright side was the return to work of 13,000 employees of General Motors corporation's five Frigidaire division plants in Dayton, O., after a week's strike. CIO United Electrical Workers voted to return after the union and the company agreed to negotiate with reference to disciplinary action against four employees suspended by the company.

A conference of clergy of the Episcopal diocese for Southern Oregon, to be held in Roseburg Wednesday and Thursday, will be featured by a public service at 8 P. M. Wednesday, Father William Blaker, rector of St. George's Episcopal church, reported today. All members of the parish and others interested are urged by Father Blaker to attend the service at which Bishop Benjamin D. Dagwell and Father Louis B. Kelter, Portland, will be the principal speakers. Clergy from all Episcopal churches of the southern part of the state, from Eugene south, will be in attendance at the Roseburg conference, which will be devoted to church planning, problems relating to service to returning veterans and other current issues.

Plan to Boost Resort Rates Denied by Owners

DEPOE BAY, Ore., Oct. 8.—(AP)—Beach resort owners have denied reports they will boost 1946 rates from 25 to 50 per cent over this year's scale, the Oregonian reported. A survey of resorts from Seaside to Gold Beach showed many cottages available for \$12 to \$18 weekly with a few better ones asking \$50 or more. Owners admitted higher labor, food and fuel costs had resulted in some price boosts, however. One said wood now cost \$13 instead of the prewar \$8.

Less Fish Being Eaten. WASHINGTON, Oct. 8.—(AP)—Public demand for fish, which reached a peak in table popularity during the war, is falling off sharply. Reporting retail sales off as much as 60 per cent in certain markets, the National Fishery institute said today increased meat and poultry supplies and reduced ration point values are mainly responsible.
