Borowy, Newhouse to Hurl in Deciding Game

CHICAGO, Oct. 9.—(AP)—It'll be Hank Borowy pitching for the Chicago Cubs and Hal Newhouse for the Detroit Tigers in tomorrow's seventh and decisive World Series game in Wrigley field.

Borowy already has appeared in three series games and came out of them with a record of two wins and one defeat. He made his last appearance yesterday, going to the mound in the 9th inning. He was the fourth Cub twirler in the free-hitting contest.

Previously Borowy pitched the Cubs to a 9-0 triumph in the opening day, and was charged with the Cubs' loss in Chicago Sunday of the fifth game, 8-4, in which he was relieved in the sixth inning.

Newhouse was Borowy's mound opponent in the first and fifth games. Thus he has a 1-1 record in the current series, and will enter the game with almost three days of rest, whereas in the same span of time Borowy has pitched approximately 10 innings.
