HEROES ARE MADE--NOT BORN

Strange Cloud Veiling Over Crater Lake Poses Question As To Its Possible Portent

CRATER LAKE, Oregon, Oct. 5.—Will volcanic activity again return to Crater Lake, after an absence of five thousand years? This is the question to which the staff of the park have been giving serious thought within the last few weeks, because of strange and unusual gas or smoke cloud which has been seen hovering over the calm blue waters of the lake on three different occasions recently by at least three reliable observers. This smoke or gas cloud appears to have risen from the waters of the lake in the middle section at a point where the geological survey map shows the depth to be 1956 feet.

This strange and peculiar dust-colored cloud was first observed by Miss Linda Newhall, fire lookout on the Watchman on the west side of the lake, on September 15, who reported it as a dust-colored fog or smoke cloud forming on or arising from the waters of the lake. At the time the lake was calm, the weather clear and beautiful, and there was no sign of a storm or fog condition. Apparently it was not a dust cloud caused by a slide of rock and pumice from the crater walls, for the cloud was formed near the center of the lake, far from the walls of the crater. It rose sharply, then mushroomed out, and finally spread and drifted away with the wind currents.

Cloud Seen By Others
The second smoke or gas cloud was seen on September 17, from the summit of Garfield Peak, by Mr. Dale Vincent, photographer, naturalist and writer living along the Rogue River near Gold Hill, Oregon, who was in the park to take photographs of the lake. On this occasion, the same dust-colored cloud arose from the waters of the lake in long ribbon-like formations. It, too, occurred on a clear, cloudless day.

The third person to observe this strange phenomenon was Park Ranger Kenneth A. Hulbert on September 30. He first observed it about 11:15 A. M. from a look-out point on the west side of the lake, between Hillman Peak and Liao Rock. The cloud was about 300 to 400 feet wide and extended upward to a distance of four hundred to five hundred feet. It was diamond shaped, narrow at the top and bottom and wider in the middle of the formation. He observed it from all the various look-out points along the rim, as far south as the Crater Lake lodge, and it finally drifted away much as smoke does from a forest fire.

One Theory Advanced
Hulbert is sure it was not caused by a slide; there was no wind or storm conditions to cause it, as the day was bright and warm with the surface of the lake perfectly calm, reflecting magnificently the colorful crater walls and forests which surround the lake.

No explanation for the strange and unusual smoke or gas cloud seems possible, except that a blurb of smoke or gas was released from some of the vents which undoubtedly exist on the floor of this old extinct or dormant crater, and passed through the water to escape to the air above. The staff has been directed to watch for recurrences of the smoke or gas formation, and efforts will be made to obtain a picture of it should the phenomenon occur again.

Okinawas Lashed By Typhoon; Heavy Casualties Feared

NEW YORK, Oct. 11.—(AP)—John Adams, CBS correspondent, said in a broadcast from Manila today that 90,000 soldiers had been left without quarters, five killed and a score wounded in the typhoon which struck Okinawa island Tuesday.

Several correspondents on the first plane to take off from Okinawa since the storm reported "damage to great that, had it come a month earlier, it could well have changed the entire pattern of our occupation," he said. "Had invasion of Japan been necessary it might have been a major military disaster."

"The southern part of the island took the worst beating, with nearly all Army and Navy installations destroyed," he quoted the correspondents as saying.

"No details were available on damage to naval installations, but as the plane circled the island this morning, the correspondents could see many small craft beached helter-skelter on the shore, and fears were expressed that naval casualties may run into several hundreds."

"Also hard hit were some 500 Army nurses who were in a transient camp en route to Japan. Although they suffered no casualties, they lost their tents and many personal belongings, and were forced to ride out the worst of the storm crouching in scores of ill-smelling native tombs, ancient stone sculptures that dot the hillsides of the island."

Political Peace Reached By Chinese Factions

CHUNGKING, Oct. 11.—(AP)—Chinese nationalist and communist negotiators for a unified China issued a communique today agreeing upon basic principles of political peace in a nation split for decades by bloody fighting for government control. The communique also set forth the negotiators' willingness to continue the talks which have been under way during a five-week-old truce in the fighting, and to submit complex military and political questions still unsettled to a military subcommittee and a broadly constituted political consultative council.

The statement indicated the determination of nationalist leader Chiang Kai-shek to achieve "unity of political authority" immediately.

Red Cross Raps French Treatment of Nazi POWs

FRANKFURT, Germany, Oct. 11.—(AP)—U. S. headquarters suspended today the transfer of any further German prisoners to the French after the International Red Cross charged that captives in French hands were suffering from malnutrition and not being treated according to the Geneva convention.

The American Army has turned over to the French approximately 700,000 prisoners of war for work in rehabilitating France. An agreement was signed last spring for the transfer of 1,300,000.

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
