

Tigers' Batting Power Too Much For Cubs' Hurlers

CHICAGO, Oct. 11.—(AP)—Baseball's takeoff on the nine old men—eight old men and a boy, in this case—brought the world championship back to Detroit today for the first time in 10 years, all because the Chicago Cubs ran out of gas and pitchers against the Tiger trigger-men in the clutch.

That, plus some fancy flinging by Lefty Hal Newhouser, for a new series knockout record for seven games, meant the ball game and the set in the finale yesterday. Hal was the boy in the cast—he is 24—and the boy turned out to be quite a man as he backed up his second win of the scramble.

That was the story in yesterday's 9-to-3 playoff. Charlie Grimm was so desperate for pitchers, after using most of them Sunday and Monday, he finally had to reach into the barrel and come up with Borowy for his third consecutive game.

Nine Pitches Finish Borowy
Good as Borowy was in this series—he won twice and lost twice—the Tigers got to him early. They drove him from the hill after nine pitches which three Tigers converted into singles and one run. Five other Cub pitchers followed him to the mound.

The Tigers' hitting power when it was needed, and tight pitching in the pinches, was what made the Cubs lose their seventh series opportunity in 37 years after beating the Tigers in 1907-08. The Tigers—all the regulars except the pitchers are over 30—put on some great exhibitions of daffiness out there in the field from time to time. But when the pin were down they picked them up with alacrity.

Greenberg Series Star
It wasn't only one of them, although Hank Greenberg was in the forefront. He is a slowed up 35 now, but he was the glamour boy of the series. He hammered one homer that won a game, another that kept his ball club in it; thumped three double in one tilt; scored seven runs and knocked in seven. He wound up with a .304 batting mark which, with his 1934 and 1934 flailing, made him one of 12 men in all series history to go for .300 or better in three or more series.

Cavarretta, the Cubs first sacker and probably the most underrated man in the set, went a little better in this department. He was the No. 1 ball buster and came to the wire with a .423 mark, the second time he's run through a series at a snappy .400 or better. Now he's one of only eight hitters ever to turn the trick twice, and at the finish some of the folks were wondering how come he wasn't wearing a Tiger uniform there.

Seals Beat Rainiers, 6-1, To Square Cup Series

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 11.—(AP)—Back on their home field, the San Francisco Seals squared the Pacific Coast League Governors' cup playoff finals at two games apiece by beating the Seattle Rainiers 6-1 last night. The victory gave Seward, No. 2 Seal pitcher, revenge for his defeat at the hands of Fischer in the first game of the series. The righthander held the Rainiers to six hits as his teammates were shelling Fischer from the mound with a four-run attack in the fifth inning.

Tonight 31-game winner Bob Joyce, who gave San Francisco

its first triumph over Seattle last Saturday, will again take the mound against Farmer Hal Turpin.

GIs Want Ship Priority Ahead of British Brides

LONDON, Oct. 10.—(AP)—English brides of American soldiers valued from all over Britain today for a mass meeting and demonstration planned for London tomorrow as part of a campaign to obtain speedy transportation across the Atlantic so they may join their husbands in the United States.

Doughboys with wives in the United States meanwhile entered the debate, 16 affixing their signatures to a letter to the London edition of Stars and Stripes protesting that the use of ships to send English brides to America would be a blow to their own hopes of a speedy return home.

"Before we send any British brides or babies to America, let's make sure that all American soldiers who left their homes to fight for their country are sent home," they wrote.

More Salvage Fat From Oregon Urgently Needed

Collection of salvage fat in Oregon for 1945 has run well over 1944 figures, but there is still urgent need for continuing salvage at a high level even though the war is over, according to a personal report made to O.S.C. extension officials.

Because there appears to be no indication of early relief from the fat shortage through resumption of imports, the department of agriculture is laying great stress on the continuing need for salvaging every pound of fat and oil. County extension staffs are checking up on collection points and local committee work in an effort to stimulate continued fat saving in rural areas, from where much of the salvage has come this year.

Roy J. Carnall was taken to Portland Monday where he en-

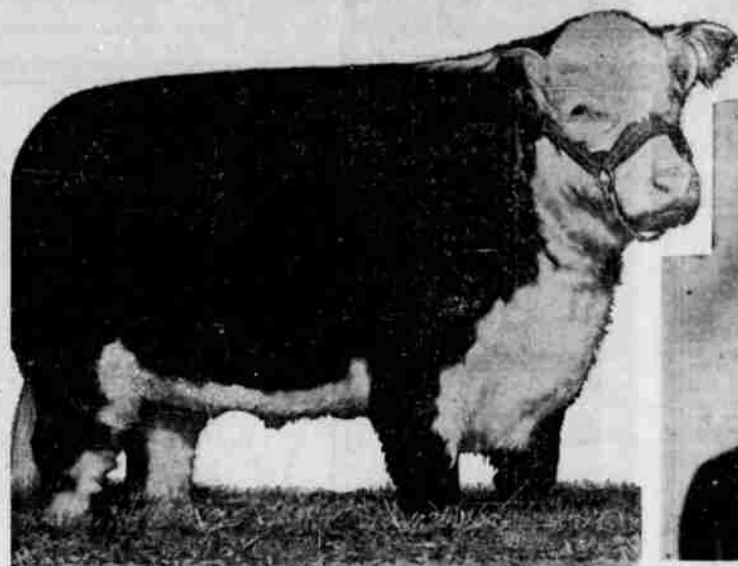
tered the Veterans hospital for medical treatment.

Mrs. Roy J. Carnall and her niece, Mrs. Lewis McAnaney, of Roseburg, went to Eugene Monday.

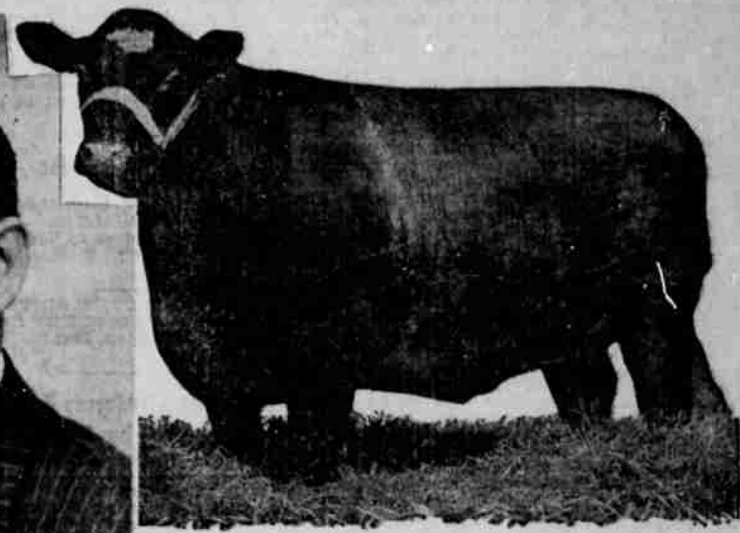
