## Lunch Program At Benson School To Be Repeated

Mrs. R. V. Coffman, chairman of the Benson P.T.A. hot lunch project, announced today that arrangements have been completed with the U. S. Department of Agriculture for joint sponsorship of a 1945-46 school lunch program at the Benson school.

This is the second year in which children at the Benson school will be served tasty and nutritious noon meals at low cost, or no cost, if the child cannot afford to pay. It was estimated by Mrs. Coffman that 215 students will be served lunches daily at the school.

Under a cooperative agreement with the government, Mrs. Coffman said, the Benson P.T.A. will obtain the labor and facilities needed to prepare noon meals and will contribute part of the cost of all food purchased.

A cook and two helpers, at least one mother, one primary teacher and one intermediate grade teacher are needed daily to serve the lunches. The P.T.A. is urging that every mother having a child at Benson school cooperate with the committee by volunteering to help occasionally with the noon lunch.

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## Truman Reports On Appropriation For Foreign Relief

WASHINGTON, Oct. 12.—(AP)—President Truman told Congress yesterday only \$20,000,000 of this country's \$800,000,000 appropriation for United Nations relief remained uncommitted Aug. 31.

Mr. Truman transmitted the fourth report on American participation in UNRRA as the House appropriations committee began closed hearings on his request for another \$350,000,000 to meet "acute need and privation" in Europe this winter.

"Life abroad in the coming winter," the report said in a letter transmitting the report, "will depend upon the outside assistance which this country and other countries can render to the liberated peoples."

A statistical table showed that as of Sept. 15 all 44 nations participating had pledged \$1,882,759,691 to UNRRA. Of this, \$1,268,750,254 had been paid in or is "available on request" toward "operating" expenses while \$1,415,334 had been contributed for administrative purposes.

In "process of contribution" for operating purposes was \$597,365,987, including the \$550,000,000 pledged but unpaid by this country; while \$1,228,416 was still due in 1945 toward administrative expenses.

Great Britain's total pledge of \$322,400,000 is paid. Russia, which is obligated only for administrative contributions because she is defined as a "liberated" country, has paid \$1,000,000 and still owes \$750,000 for 1945. Russia paid \$800,000 in the third quarter.

## Pheasant Season Opens Tomorrow; Ducks Still Scarce

PORTLAND, Oct. 12.—(AP)—The annual duck shooting season opens in Oregon tomorrow, but the ducks haven't arrived yet.

With sunny weather still prevalent in Canadian breeding areas, ducks and geese are not expected to migrate to Oregon marshes for a few weeks yet.

The outlook for China pheasants—also legally shootable tomorrow—isn't much better. State Game commission biologists estimate that wet weather during the nesting season has cut the total to half of last year.

The same drawback applies to Hungarian partridges and quail. Despite bleak prospects, more than a hundred thousand Oregon nimrods, equipped for the first time in three years with plenty of gasoline, are expected to turn out for the migratory waterfowl and upland game bird season.

Migratory waterfowl remain on the open list until December 31. The pheasant, quail and partridge season closes at varying dates in different counties, from Oct. 17 to Nov. 5.

The bag limit on ducks is 10 a day or 20 in possession; geese, 6 or 12 in possession. Hungarian partridge limit is 6 a day; quail 10 in a week or in possession. The pheasant limit varies with counties.

Roseburg wrestling fans will get plenty of good fast wrestling at the armory Saturday night. The Gray Mask, in another swing through Pacific Northwest wrestling circles, will take on a returned veteran from the South Pacific, Joe Lynam. The other half of the bill will pit Roseburg's heavyweights bout between Joe Kahut and Hilton (Fitzy) Fitzpatrick.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 12.—(AP)—San Francisco Seals unlimbered their long-range batting guns again last night to defeat the Seattle Rainiers 7-4, taking a 3-2 edge in the Pacific Coast league Governors' cup playoff finals.

With the score knotted at four in the last of the ninth, Right Fielder Sheridan blasted a three-run homer over the left field wall to give the Seals their second straight victory on their home grounds. Hal Turpin was the losing pitcher.

The sixth game of the seven-tit series will be played tonight with the Rainiers depending on their reliable Joe Demoran, winner of three straight playoff games. He will be opposed on the

ground by Barthelme, who was charged with last Sunday's loss at Seattle. If a seventh and deciding game is necessary it will be played here this Sunday afternoon.

## Don't Market Turkeys Too Soon, Growers Advised

A recent tendency of some turkey growers to rush birds to market for fear of a price decline is not considered sound business by Noel L. Bennion, extension poultry specialist at Oregon State college. The movement followed the removal of the Army set-aside order on turkeys September 24.

The way to "avoid an early market glut and further decline in price is for growers to market their birds in an orderly manner," says Bennion. It is never a good plan to sell turkeys before they are in prime condition, he adds. Hens will mature and be ready for market on an average of at least two weeks before toms and are best sold accordingly. If an adequate supply of mash or pellets is not available, turkeys can be finished on grains and green feed.

Bennion also calls attention to a possible surplus of hatching eggs and poults next spring as a result of an indicated 25 to 30 per cent increase in the number of breeder hens carried over this season compared with a year ago. The cost of producing poults and eggs will continue high while a surplus will inevitably cut prices.

## Social Disease Increase Seen in Demobilization

PORTLAND, Oct. 12.—(AP)—Demobilization will bring an increase in venereal disease—also in civilian responsibility to control it, the director of the Navy venereal disease control division said here.

Disease rates turned sharply upward just after V-day, reported Lt. Col. Thomas B. Sternberg. Army protective measures and education will not be available after servicemen are discharged, he pointed out.

Commander John W. Ferree, Navy chief of venereal disease control, urged that recreation centers be maintained to provide activity for men back from combat. The officers spoke to civic and social leaders here.
