Joe Kahut Given Unpopular Verdict Over Fitzpatrick

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 13.—(AP)—Joe Kahut, Woodburn, Ore., sailor, was another stop up the little ladder today with a decision over rugged Hilton Fitzpatrick, Oak Hill, West Va., in a 10-round slugging match here last night.

Neither boy was off his feet. From the start they stood toe-to-toe, head to head and clugged it out when they weren't all tied up in a good imitation of a wrestling match. Fitzpatrick opened a gash over Kahut's left eye with a sizzler in the seventh, and the fight ended with both boys gore-covered.

Yunone was a civilian who assumed the rank of a navy lieutenant. Yesterday allied authorities identified publicly for the first time the Japanese in the much-publicized photograph, which showed the beheading of a captured Australian aviator on New Guinea.

Police finally dislodged the demonstrators and permitted distribution of the newspaper.

(Continued from Page 1) Ohio, Tennessee and Indiana. Drivers Plan Strike Vote As the government wrestled with these two major disputes, another front-ranking controversy loomed as a strike ballot for the teamsters' affiliate, the AFL, was held in New York City.

The CIO National Maritime union, through its San Francisco port agent, James Drury, protested the arrest of AFL pickets at Warner Brothers studio, saying their seizure was "negating the democracy for which this war was fought," and linking the action of sheriff's deputies to that of "storm troopers."

Lumber-Picketing AFL workers continued their attempts to close northwest mills employing CIO workers. That a new picket line was established as Coos Bay, Ore., was acknowledged by the CIO Longshoremen's union there. Otherwise there was no change in the lumber strike outlook as 60,000 men remained idle.

Warehousemen—The Oakland membership of the CIO International Longshoremen's and Warehousemen's union authorized a stop-work meeting "whenever necessary" in the course of negotiations with more than 30 employers. The local has requested 46 hours' pay per week at the present rate with a reduction of working hours to 40 weekly.

War Worker Kills His 2 Children and Himself LIVINGSTON, Mont., Oct. 13.—(AP)—Coroner Robert Franzen planned to hold an inquest today into the tragedy which resulted in the slaying of two Livingston youngsters and the subsequent suicide of their father here yesterday.

William R. Reese, 30-year-old war worker, who had returned home only the previous night from Oakland, Calif., shot his two children—Johnny, 8, and Janie, who would have been 4 Sunday—while they were playing in bed awaiting their grandmother's call to breakfast yesterday morning, the coroner asserted.

Reese then shot himself in the head, Franzen declared. He died two hours later. Notes, saying Reese grieved over being partially paralyzed in one leg and "domestic difficulties" were found under the children's pillows, Franzen added.

The children's mother, Mrs. Lucille Reese, had left for work shortly before the tragedy.

Union Oil Co. to Suspend Aviation Gasoline Sale The Union Oil company announced today that its aviation gasoline is to be withdrawn from service stations effective Monday, Oct. 15. The action, it was stated, results from a new OPA amendment prohibiting sale of any gasoline to the motoring public at a higher price than permitted for ethyl gasoline. Oil company officials point out that it is not economically possible to sell the higher grade fuel at ethyl prices. Consequently the new product is being taken off the market until the OPA regulation is adjusted or withdrawn.
